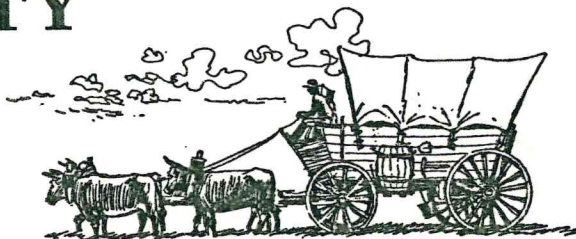

Conference in the States

Mississippi hospitality and the sugary white beaches of the gulf coast drew nearly 1400 genealogists to the 8th Annual National Genealogical Society Conference in the States at Biloxi.

Over one-hundred lectures on an almost endless variety of genealogical topics were presented by speakers from the United States and Great Britain. Special sessions were held for beginners, genealogical instructors, newsletter

editors, librarians and computer users.

Participating organizations included the Board for Certification of Genealogists, the Association of Professional Genealogists, the International Society for British Genealogy and Family History, the National Institute on Genealogical Research Alumni Association and the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

The 1988 Conference was hosted by the L. W. Anderson Genealogical Library at Gulfport with the assistance and cooperation of twelve local organizations. Anne S. Anderson, founder and director of the library served as host society chairman.

The 1989 Conference in the States will be held 17-20 May 1989 in St. Paul, Minnesota.

NGS Newsletter Competition

Winners of the National Genealogical Society's 1987 Genealogical Newsletter Competition are the German Genealogical Society of America (Class III), the Jewish Genealogical Society, Inc. (Class II), and the Central Florida Genealogical and Historical Society (Class I).

The winners were announced on 28 April at the NGS Conference in the States in Biloxi. Fifty-two genealogical societies from twenty-three states and Nova Scotia entered their publications in the competition. The winning societies received a certificate, a year's membership in NGS, and the opportunity for each to have an article about its programs, activities, and publications published in the NGS Newsletter.

Congratulations to the Pioneer Genealogical Society, Ponca City, Oklahoma for an excellent showing in Class I (societies with fewer than 300 members). The Pioneer Genealogical Society Newsletter placed sixth in a field of thirty-three.

New Books

Cherokee By Blood: Records of Eastern Cherokee Ancestry in the U.S. Court of Claims, 1906-1910. Volume 1. By Jerry Wright Jordan. Published by Heritage Books, Inc. 1540E Pointer Ridge Pl., Suite 108, Bowie, MD 20716. 1987. xv, 482 pp. \$25.00 plus \$2.00 postage and handling.

This series contains abstracts from the applications submitted by Cherokee and others who claimed to be Cherokee or descendants of Cherokee who were living east of the Mississippi River in 1835. Representing 90,000 individuals, the nearly 46,000 applications are often referred to as the Guion Miller Rolls. The first volume contains applications 1-1550. A complete name index is included. The second volume will have applications 1551-4200 and is due to be published this spring.

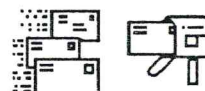
The 1986 Periodical Source Index. Michael Clegg, ed. Compiled by the staff of the Genealogy Department of the Allen County Public Library.

PERSI is a comprehensive place, subject, and surname index to current genealogical and local history periodicals. The 1986 volume includes citations from over 1000 periodicals received by the Genealogy Department of the Allen County Public Library in calendar year 1986 having a publication date of 1986.

The publication is an index of articles from tables of contents of the periodicals. PERSI is divided into five parts: United States Places; Families; Canadian Places; Foreign Places; Research Methodology. There are fifteen Record Types including Biography, Cemetery, Census, Court, Military, Obituaries, etc. PERSI is an article index, not an every name index.

The 1987 Persi volume includes 25,000 entries from 1500 periodical and is now available for \$35.00 from the above address. A retrospective PERSI covering periodicals from 1847-1985 will be available in 1989. [The editor will be happy to check her copy of the 1986 volume for your area or surnames.]



Letter Wise

In general, typed letters will reach the addressee in a large city one day earlier than handwritten envelopes. The optical scanner will read the address in the reverse order from bottom to top starting with zip code, then state, then city, then street address or box number just above, on the next to last line.

If there is an "Attn (name of person or dept)" at the bottom left of envelope, it will be kicked out by the scanner and wait until a human eye can sort it. If the box number is where all mail should be sent, be sure to put it after the street address and just before city, state and zip.

Use your zip + 4 whenever possible; mail may reach you a day sooner since it pinpoints your location within your city more precisely than just the five digit zip.
