1998 has been a successful year for CCGS!

In August, Lloyd **BOCKSTRUCK** of the Dallas Public Library marked fourteen years as Speaker at successful CCGS Workshops. His topics were "Lesser Known Records" and "The Scots-Irish Along the Great Wagon Trail." Once again he left us with many new ideas and resources for research.

MICROFILMING CLEVELAND COUNTY RECORDS

The GSU (Genealogy Society of Utah) Committee of CCGS is assisting in the filming of early Cleveland County records for the LDS collection in Salt Lake City. Filming has been completed at the courthouse and will soon move to our Library to microfilm our publications. The next stage will include microfilming some locally published family histories. Lastly, we will invite local organizations and churches to make their early records available for the project.

Eventually, we will receive copies of all the film for our Library to aid Cleveland County researchers. Volunteer hours contributed to the project earn additional film copies from Salt Lake City. In McClain County, where the filming has recently been completed, society members have received over 600 rolls of film now available for viewing at the Purcell Library. We hope to meet or exceed that number for CCGS! Alan **MONTGOMERY** serves as chair of this committee.

NSG Standards

STANDARDS FOR SOUND GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH RECOMMENDED BY THE NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

Remembering always that they are engaged in a quest for truth, family history researchers consistently...

- Record the source for each item of information they collect.
- Test every hypothesis or theory against credible evidence, and reject those that are not supported by the evidence.
- Seek original records, or reproduced images of them when there is reasonable assurance they have not been altered, as the basis for their research conclusions.
- Use compilations, communications and published works, whether paper or electronic, primarily for their value as guides to locating the original records.
- State something as a fact only when it is supported by convincing evidence, and identify the evidence when communicating the fact to others.
- Limit with words like "probable" or "possible" any statement that is based on less than convincing evidence, and state the reasons for concluding that it is probable or possible.
- Avoid misleading other researchers by either intentionally or carelessly distributing or publishing inaccurate information.
- State carefully and honestly the results of their own research, and acknowledge all use of other researchers' work.
- Recognize the collegial nature of genealogical research by making their work available to others through publication, or by placing copies in appropriate libraries or repositories, and by welcoming critical comment.
- Consider with open minds new evidence or the comments of others on their work and the conclusions they have reached.

In The Library

CCGS LIBRARY COMMITTEE

For some time now, CCGS has seen the need for a Library Committee. There have been some problems and delays in getting started, but for the time being, this committee will function as a part of the 3R's Committee. According to the rules of CCGS, number 13:

"This committee shall oversee the general maintenance and business of the Library.

The committee shall recommend changes in operating policies and suggest to the Board books and other data for approval to purchase."

Recent accomplishments in these areas include: a change in the guest register form, thank you cards for responding to gifts, a suggestion box encouraging ideas for purchase of materials for the Library, and an inventory of equipment and furniture. Currently, the inventory and the matter of maintenance is handled by the Library Manager.

In committee meeting, Olier **VALLIERE** was recommended to be appointed as Library Manager for the calendar year 1999. (This action was approved in the December Board Meeting.)

There was considerable discussion on the issue of copy fees. It was agreed that the current copy rates would continue (i.e., ten cents a page for copies, ten cents a page for computer printouts, twenty-five cents a copy from the reader-printer, and one dollar per copy from the Funeral Home records. These prices cover our costs and are competitive in our area. It was underscored in discussion that these rates apply uniformly to anyone regardless of membership or patronage or the number of copies.

In further business, a Sub-Committee has been formed to ascertain that our publications have been properly copyrighted.

At the next meeting, we will begin to organize two major projects. One is a program of training

for Library volunteers. The second is to develop a process for selecting books and materials for purchase. In this matter, we are encouraging anyone to submit suggestions and recommendations to the Library. We will consider both specific items and general ideas in both categories, and look forward to your contributions.

The Noble Educational Association has effected permanent organization and from this time forth the school interests of Noble will be under the most liberal intelligent and progressive management. Under the above name, the people of this town have organized themselves into a chartered corporation with a capital stock of \$5,000, divided into 1000 shares at \$5 each. The directors chosen are E. B. ALLEN, J. G. THOMPSON, G. W. THOMPSON, J. W. KLINGLESMTIH, C. P. KLINGLESMTIH, Dr. E. TAYLOR, J. P. PERKINS, W. A. MEDLOCK and Isaac GRAHAM.

The board of directors as stated above, have elected the following named gentlemen as officers: E. B. ALLEN, president; J. W. KLINGLESMTIH, secretary, and J. G. THOMPSON, treasure.

TOWN TALK

Mrs. Beulah CASLER of Oklahoma City, and Mrs. Lillie HARWOOD of the same place, have been visiting with old friends in Noble during the past week. Mrs. HARWOOD was formerly a pupil of Prof. MACREADY'S at Pottsboro, Texas where she stood in the front ranks as a scholar, and Mrs. CASLER was formerly of Dallas, where her mother, Mrs. BEDDO was in charge of the BUCKNER'S Orphans Home. These talented ladies delighted their friends here by their visit and Noble will miss them very much when they leave.

Purcell has had two disastrous fires recently - one on last Friday and the other on Sunday night following. Noland's opera house and Miss GRAY'S millinery establishment adjoining it, were burned Friday. The CLIFTON hotel, Christian church and two private residences were burned Sunday night. The loss in property

is established at about \$12,500, partially covered by insurance. The origin of the fire, smacks of incendiarism. The CLIFTON was the largest and best hotel in the Chickasaw nation.

From a private letter, we learn that Judge MOSELEY of Lexington, came very near freezing to death Tuesday in the Pott country. He had started home, when he got lost on the prairie - wandered around for some time, and finally wound up at a farm house where he was taken in and provided for - but was farther from home than when he started. Here's better luck to you next time, judge.

We understand that our young friend Harry KEYS of the Register office, covered himself all over with glory at the recent fire in Purcell. If it had not been for his prompt action, unflinching nerve and extraordinary coolness, there is no doubt but what the entire north side of Main street would have been consumed by the flames. Harry is a fire-fighter from away back.

Mrs. WAGGONER, who lived on the Scruggs claim, just half a mile east of town, and the mother of J. M. and Dan WAGGONER, died Sunday with pneumonia. Her remains were interred in the Shiloh school house cemetery Tuesday - followed by a large concourse of friends to their last resting place. She was a most estimable lady and the whole community mourn her demise.

The primary department of the Noble Academy is now taught in the brick church, with Mrs. Maud FUGATE in charge.

Our streets were thronged with drummers Tuesday.

Work on the new calabooks will commence at once.

MENNONITE RESEARCH

The 1994 and 1998 quarterly issues and the January 1984 issue of Mennonite Family History and the July 1998 issue of Pennsylvania Mennonite Heritage have been added to the CCG Library Collection by Lisa SHEPPARD. The April 1998 issue of Mennonite Family History carries an article entitled "Evaluating Genealogical Information" as well as articles on family origins and history.

Arvilla Rogers GRIFFITH has donated the 1997 issues of two Ohio Genealogical Society publications. The Report is published quarterly. The Spring issue carries a list of "Ohio Persons Who Went to Keokuk County, Iowa," information from a physician's records, and Bible records of several families. Each issue carries several similar articles. The Ohio Genealogical Society Newsletter is published monthly and includes accessions and queries among other things.

Mrs. GRIFFITH also donated five issues of "Newton County Roots" published quarterly by Genealogy Friends of the Library in Neosho, Missouri. Beginning in the March 1997 issue (Vol. IX, No. 1) and concluding in the December issue is "FERTIG'S Journal," excerpts from the journal of James A. FERTIG of Wentworth, Newton Co., Missouri.

On December 19, 1898, 19 year old James starts for Oklahoma with his friend, Charley STEWARD, and Charley's family. James keeps a daily journal of their travels west to Caldwell, Kansas, then south through Enid to Dover then west to Camarga in what is now Dewey County.

James helps the STEWARDS as they build three sod houses. The land James files on had already been filed on but he contests it and finally receives the land. On March 4, 1899, he slept in a house for the first time in "77 long nights." In May, he returns to Wentworth on his bicycle, his "wheel," arriving five months after he left. He makes several more trips to Oklahoma before he decides to sell his land there and live out his life in Missouri.

He leaves a good description of what the life of an Oklahoma settler was like. [The Record, Vol. 5, No. 1, September 1998]
