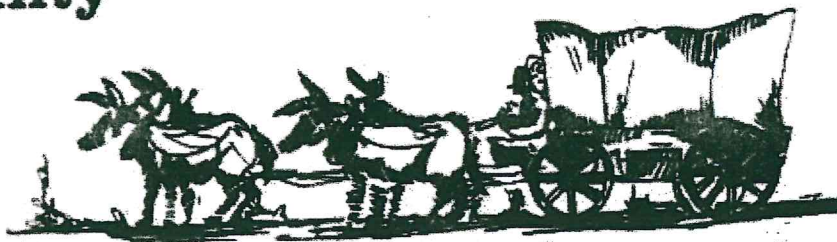

One of the advantages of having a new President who is the son of a President is that most of the genealogy has already been done. Much has been added to the ancestor chart for George Herbert Walker **BUSH** since he was first elected President. With George Walker **BUSH'S** confirmation as our next President, the ancestors of his mother, Barbara Pierce **BUSH**, have been added. This report is based primarily on the work of Gary Boyd **ROBERTS** from the 1995 edition of his book, "Ancestors of American Presidents." February 1st.

Corn has been in active demand here this week
and sells for twenty-five cents per bushel on the
streets.

Material for several good farm buildings has
been hauled out to several claims adjacent to
the city during the past few days.

The Perkin's town-site bill has passed through
the lower house of congress and we hope to be
able to secure titles to town lots soon.

Norman now affords another barber shop and
the price of shaving has dropped down to ten
cents. Competition is the life of trade.

The Territory ice crop will undoubtedly prove to
be a failure this winter. Cold weather does not
last long enough to freeze much in this latitude.

W. J. WOODS, of Oklahoma City, has an
exhibition at the ATKINS building, the wonderful
Egyptian mummy and other curiosities.
Admission only 10 cents.

M. MCGINLEY has recently purchased a stock
of groceries from Messrs. MYERS & SHANNON
of Purcell, and will remove and add them to his
stock at this point.

HUNTER, the market man here, has a young
catamount on exhibition at his market on Main
street. The animal is a ferocious little beast and
was captured somewhere on Little River, lately.

The genial countenance of J. W. HALL can be observed upon our streets once more he having returned to Norman from Arkansas, last Saturday. He has not enjoyed good health while away and is now firmly convinced that there is no place like Oklahoma in general, and Norman in particular.

L. S. SYKES, and family came in from Texas, Thursday of last week, and are now residents of our little city. Mr. SYKES some time ago, came here on a tour of inspection and was so well pleased with the outlook that he purchased property and is now here to stay. We extend a cordial welcome to all such desirable citizens.

C. B. MCGINLEY, a brother of our Mac, and a well known business man of the Chickasaw nation, has disposed of his interests in Purcell and will remove within a few days, to Norman. We welcome Mr. and Mrs. MCGINLEY to our thriving little city well knowing that our community will be the gainer by their removal to our midst.

We have seen the plans and specifications of the brick building Robert ANIOL proposes to erect here at an early day. It will be a large and handsome structure, and a credit alike to the builder and Norman.

A large number of settlers from the extreme southern portion of Oklahoma, have been coming to Norman during the past two weeks to trade. The Canadian river has most of the time been too high for fording and the people were compelled to travel long distances to secure the necessaries of life.

PLUMB'S BILL

The following is the text of Senator PLUMB'S homestead bill, which passed the senate a few days since:

"Be it enacted etc..

That the provisions of section 2301 of the revised statutes are hereby extended to lands in the Indian Territory opened on April 22, 1889 by the proclamation of the president."

Section 2301 of the revised statutes is the one which allows commutation of homesteads after a six months residence on the payment of \$1.25 per acre.

Democratic Convention

The democratic convention held here last Saturday was well attended and successful organization was perfected by the adoption of bye-laws and regulations and the election of permanent officers.

The convention assembled in the ATKINS building, and was called to order by A. S. GUM, who after stating the object of the convention and its duties, declared nominations for temporary officers, in order. Frank P. CEASE, of Noble, was elected temporary chairman and B. B. BLAKENEY, temporary secretary.

A committee of five each on permanent organization and resolutions were appointed, the former consisting of T. E. **BERRY**, chairman, M. M. **GOUGH**, B. B. **BLAKENY**, J. D. **KENDRICK** and A. **HUTCHIN**. On resolutions, J. E. **GRIGSBY** chairman, G. P. **JOHNSON**, J. G. **VARNUM** R. R. **GREEN** and ___ **GOSS**.

Col. T. S. **JONES**, of Guthrie, delivered a lengthy democratic speech. The committee on permanent organization reported:

We, the committee on permanent organization, respectfully recommend that the permanent organization consist of a chairman, secretary, treasurer and one committeeman from each of the following towns:

And further recommend J. M. **HEDDENS**, of Norman, chairman; F. P. **CEASE**, of Noble, secretary; G. P. **JOHNSTON**, of Lexington, treasurer. And that the committeeman in each township proceed to organize and enroll the democrats of his township and report the same to the chairman of the county central committee. And that the convention suggest names of committeemen for each township which is left blank.

T. E. **BERRY**, Chairman.

The committee on resolutions reported as follows:

We, the democrats of Little River county, in mass convention assembled believing the policy of the democratic party is the true policy of government, urgently call upon all persons to work for the promotion and advancement of the party.

J. E. **GRIGSBY**, Chairman

Resolutions of thanks were accorded Mr. **ATKINS** for the use of his building and Col. **JONES** for his address after which the roll was signed by upwards of two hundred and forty and the convention adjourned.

OCTOBER CCGS PROGRAM

In October, Mrs. Claren KIDD, Librarian at the L. S. Youngblood Energy Library of the University of Oklahoma, presented a program on using maps in genealogy. With an emphasis on topographic maps, Mrs. KIDD explained the various features found on those for Cleveland County. She also discussed the various ways land in what is now the United States was plotted and the importance of this information when researching ancestors.

NOVEMBER CCGS PROGRAM

The November program was on "Steps to Tracing Native American Ancestry in Oklahoma." Cultural Anthropologist, Dr. Pamela S. WALLACE, Head of Exhibits and Evaluation at the Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History was the presenter. She recommended six steps beginning with first, finding the tribe, and second, learning the basic tribal history.

Dr. WALLACE stated that in Oklahoma today, there are 37 federally recognized and 39 Oklahoma recognized tribes. Each has "qualifiers" for their tribe, and the tribe determines if you qualify to be on their tribal roll.

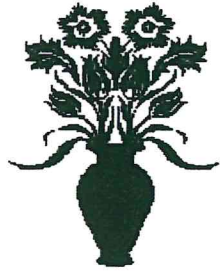


TORNADO DESTROYS LUGERT
