President's Message

nce again, I bring greetings from the Cleveland County Genealogical Society (CCGS). I hope that each of you enjoyed a festive and heart-warming Christmas and New Year. Now to do something about the unintended consequence of our Holiday eating decisions, resulting in unwanted pounds added during the Holidays. Does shivering in the cold count as exercise?

The Cleveland County Genealogical Society began the 2014 Membership drive with the December 2013 CCGS Newsletter. If you have not renewed your CCGS membership, please mail your dues to CCGS or bring them to the Genealogy Library during library hours on Tuesday, Thursday, or Saturday. Individual dues are \$20.00 per year and family dues are \$25.00. Any donation that you wish to make to CCGS over and above your dues would be greatly appreciated.

The major expense of CCGS is the rent for the Genealogy Library and Archives space at the CSBI building. In rounded numbers, the rent is \$12,000 per year. Other major annual expense items include insurance, \$800; copier maintenance, \$500; fund raising expense, \$400; and Newsletter printing and postage, \$500. The CCGS expects additional expense this year to update our computers and server.

Major sources of annual income to Cleveland County Genealogical Society, again, in rounded numbers, are estimated at: dues, \$2,400; Bakeless Bake Sale fund raiser, \$2,600; donations, \$6,000; and investment income, \$2,500.

As you can see, your donations are a vital part of the income necessary to keep the CCGS library space and to continue operations. I urge you to make a donation along with your dues and to consider making additional donations during the year. All donations to CCGS, a 501(c)(3) corporation, are tax deductible to the extent allowed by Federal Regulations.

Have you paid your 2014 Membership dues?

Annual dues are payable on the first day of January each year, regardless of when dues were paid, and become delinquent on the last day of March.

One observation of life that has been known for a very long time has been formalized as "The Law of Unintended Consequences", a concept named and popularized in the 1930's by American sociologist Robert K. Merton.

This law is of the same genre as Murphy's Law, with Finagle's Corollary, *Whatever can go wrong, will go wrong, and at the worst possible moment.*

Unintended Consequences are outcomes that are not the ones intended by a purposeful action. Unintended Consequences can be roughly grouped into three types:

- 1. A positive, unexpected benefit (usually referred to as luck or a windfall),
- 2. A negative, unexpected detriment occurring, or
- 3. A perverse effect contrary to what was originally intended (when an intended solution makes a problem worse).

On a variable scale, unintended consequences occur as a result of many of our Federal, state, and local laws and regulations, and additionally, occur as a result of many of our personal decisions. With forewarning and through thought may we each make decisions with no adverse unanticipated consequences

Since You Asked ...

Q: Are there any general reference books in the CCGS Library that are especially useful for genealogy researchers?

A: We have several unsung titles that can be particularly useful for genealogists.

Webster's New Geographical Dictionary is one book that I frequently use in the library (and also own a copy at home). This is a dictionary of place-names, mostly United States and Canada, but extending world-wide. Our 1988 edition includes nearly all incorporated places with a population of more than 2500 in the United States and Canada, as well as larger places worldwide.

Entries provide pronunciation and a description of the location, economy, and history of the area. Many maps are provided.

I especially value this reference because each entry for United States place-names includes the name of the county, making it much easier to insert this information into my computer genealogy database.

World Almanac and Book of Facts is another reference I use often, both in the CCGS Library and at home. This collection of statistical information and facts publishes a new edition every year, but I find any year's edition will yield a surprising amount of information relevant to the topics I seek.

The key to accessing information in *World Almanac* is the index, which, contrary to usual practice, is in the *front* of the book.

I most often use the Perpetual Calendar, which appears in every edition. Just find *Perpetual Calendar* in the index, turn to the designated pages, and check the chart to determine which of the numbered calendars you must peruse to learn that your greatgrandpa, born on April 15, 1856, was born on a Sunday.

Researchers can find many obscure facts like the geographical center point of every state, population of all the states in every U.S. census beginning in 1790, or a list of American colleges and universities.

The index is the key to locating any topic.

SSDI Access is Limited

The federal budget bill, signed into law on December 26 last year, eliminates public access to the Social Security Death Master File, also known as the Social Security Death Index (SSDI), for three calendar years after an individual's death.

The restrictions appear to apply only to records of those who died within the past three calendar years.

It appears that existing SSDI data that is currently online will remain online. To this date no online service provider has indicated the intention to remove information that is online now.

Why Join a Genealogical Society?

Good Roads Activities ...

Notwithstanding not much has been said about it, it must not be thought that interest in the good roads movement and the Gulf Highway is being lost in Cleveland County. Tom Carey, county president of the Gulf highway project for Cleveland; Prof. Van Vleet, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee on Good Roads; W.N. Rucker, chairman of a like committee in the Retailers' association, all three "Good Roads" boosters in the highest and best acceptation of the term are busy and active, and with the co-operation of other boosters, and especially the board of county commissioners, are reaching results, and some very material results.

For instance, these two gentlemen ... took an automobile ride over the entire stretch of the Gulf Highway through this county last Saturday, and completed the "logging" of the route through the county ...

They "logged" the road from the north line of the county through Moore on the half-section line to a point about a mile south of that town and then swung west a mile to the regular north and south road. This they keep to the M. McCullough farm corner, west of Norman thence east on Main street to Muskogee, thence south to Boyd, thence east to Jenkins, thence south to corner of farm formerly owned by R.C. Bell, thence east four miles, thence south in an almost direct line to Lexington. They found excellent road all the way. ...
