HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Norman Transcript

Norman, Indian Territory, Saturday, July 13, 1889

EDITOR'S NOTE: In an early issue of the *Norman Transcript*, this article paints a word picture revealing the federal government's absolute lack of planning for the basic structures of government in the newly opened Territory.

THE OKLAHOMA CAMPAIGN

A Lively Contest Over a Provisional Government Already On

KINGFISHER, I.T., July 8.—As has been said a thousand or more times by every newspaper of note in the United States, Oklahoma has the most thoroughly and remarkably mixed population of any country with or without political organization on the surface of the globe. Every state in the union is represented. The shrewd Yankees, ... the careless southron, ... The Hindoo and Hottentot, ... the demagogue [are here].

As a consequence of this mixture of the human family every man is made independent of his fellow man and in this territory every man has a head of his own and every man has some scheme of his own to bring its possessor wealth or political honors.

... Exclusively within itself, without any semblance of marriage relations with any other part or portion of Oklahoma, contrary to nature's laws of progeniture, Guthrie has out of her virginity given birth to a move for a provisional government.

For a time after the call by the mayors of Guthrie for the convention the people of all other portions of Oklahoma smiled at Guthrie's assumption and passed the matter as a huge joke. But only a short time passed to prove the minds of the watchful that this selfish scheme had been engineered to that point where it was impregnated with extreme danger to the welfare of our people. ...

The gentlemen engineering the scheme have a great many offices to parcel out. It will take about eight offices to make the machinery of each township complete. There will be about eight townships to the county and nine counties, I believe, according to the Guthrie apportionment of the territory in Oklahoma. Each county will require at least ten officers with handsome salaries to look after its welfare. Here are ninety more fat places to promise away. Besides these there will be employment for 200 or 300 men at the territory's expense at the seat of government. ... If, through the selfishness of Guthrie, the people are forced to have a provisional government, they will accept the other horn of the dilemma and form one without the advice, counsel, or assistance of Guthrie.

Age considered, Oklahoma excels all other countries on earth for everything. It will, then, not be very surprising if when Congress meets she will surpass the world for governments. Guthrie may knock on the door of the next Congress for recognition of its provisional government only to find Kingfisher and Oklahoma City and Reno City and Edmund knocking too for a recognition of their respective provisional governments.

The following is a portion of the call issued by William Grimes, chairman of the executive committee at Kingfisher:

In explanation to the people of the reasons impelling those who have called the Frisco convention, we respectfully submit the following:

- 1. The people of Guthrie, without consulting the welfare or pleasure of the people of Oklahoma, have called a convention for July 17, 1889, to be held at that place "To organize a provisional territorial government."
- 2. Provisional government means burdensome taxes for the masses, lucrative offices for the ringsters and big speculation for the scripts-purchasers.
- 3. In the absence of a census of Oklahoma's population, in the absence of local organizations and in the absence of many of our farmers, the organization of a provisional government at this time would result in casting bread to the schemers and stones to the people.
- 4. Provisional government is not authorized by any law of congress; it would be but a makeshift government and a real government only in burdening the people with its support.

From this time on there will be hot times in Oklahoma. There is only one thing certain and that is the creation of some expense for the people.

Since You Asked ...

- **Q.** The Norman Transcript has reported on plans for a new Norman Public Library to include a "local and family history" area. Would this include the CCGS Library collection?
- **A.** We're glad you asked. Ever since the CCGS library founder, Agnes Brooks, began collecting materials in 1990, our long-time goal has been to contribute our collection to the Norman Public Library. We see this as making genealogy and local history research more accessible for both local and visiting researchers, as well as increasing the availability from the meager twelve hours weekly our library volunteers can offer.

The Pioneer Library System handles staffing, materials, and activities for all public libraries in Cleveland, McClain, and Garvin counties. Each community, however, is responsible for the building and its maintenance. The Pioneer Library System has recently purchased the old Borders bookstore building and moved its administrative functions from the Norman Public Library to the new building, including space for a small west-side library branch.

Recent public library discussions have promoted a plan for a new eastside branch as well as a long overdue building for a central library. A new facility would provide updated computers, electronics, and engineering for current and future needs. At this time no date has been set for bringing a new plan to Norman voters.

In the meantime, CCGS leaders have met with Pioneer Library System staff and Director Anne Masters to discuss ways we can plan ahead and adapt to the inclusion of our collection in a new public library facility. PLS technology staff members are now handling the upkeep for our computer network. Steps are being taken to upgrade our catalog and make it available online.

We have suggested that this proposed new area in a proposed new building be designated as "local and family history" since our collection is, and will continue to be an excellent resource in these areas and for all related interests.

Come by and see for yourself. If you like to park near the door, we suggest Saturday afternoons. We'll do our best to help you with your next great find.

CCGS News Meetings

Pioneer Awards Made at Open House

About 40 members and friends attended the CCGS Open House on October 19, celebrating the 24th anniversary of the CCGS Genealogy Library.

Highlight of the event was the awarding of certificates naming the 2014 nominees to the CCGS *Registry of Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.*

This Registry honors individuals and couples who settled in early-day Cleveland County in the period before statehood, April 22, 1889 to November 15, 1907.

This year's nominees include Charles Greemore and his wife Lydia Alice Copeland, and Robert Monroe Evans and his wife Anna M. Greemore. Both couples were nominated by a descendant, Mike E. McCurtain.

Betty Hall highlighted the longevity of six Cleveland County pioneer families by nominating them in the names of her children, grandchildren, and greatgrandchildren.

Eight generations were represented, with the nomination of James Henry Bennett and Lucy Jane Smith in the name of their fifthgreat-grandson, Brady Michael Williams.

Other pioneer couples honored by Hall include Phillip Sullivant and Mary Elizabeth Bennett, nominated by great-great granddaughter, Shirley Kay Hall Williams;

George Washington Lewis and Nora Sullivant, nominated by their third-greatgrandson, Hayden James Williams (age 6 months);

William Doc January and Emily Elizabeth Caldwell, nominated by great-grandson Michael Lynn Hall;

Lewis Albert Hall and Anna Catherine Asher, nominated by great-great-grandson Preston Michael Hall;

And Leslie C. Hall and Amelia Dorothea Jahn nominated by great-granddaughter, Tiffany Ann Hall.

The final Pioneers named to the Registry in 2014 are Ira H. Young and his wife Sallie Elsie Hooper, nominated by their granddaughter, Nancy Young Blake.

Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.

The Registry of *Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.* is a continuing project of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society.

The purpose of this project is to identify the territorial settlers of Cleveland County, to honor their memory, and to gather a collection of genealogical information about them and their families for the benefit of future family researchers.

Anyone who lived in Cleveland County on or before November 15, 1907, is eligible to be named a *Pioneer of Cleveland County, O.T.* The Pioneer does not have to have been born or died here.

Anyone who is a direct descendant of the Pioneer for whom he or she is registering may apply.

Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T. will be recognized once a year, and certificates given to their nominating descendant at that time.

Applications for 2015 recognitions must be submitted on or before August 15, 2015. Applications are now available at the CCGS Genealogical Library, just inside the south entrance of the CSBI Building.

Pioneers Workshop Planned

Persons who are interested in applying for an ancestor's inclusion in the Registry of *Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.* may find help in the workshop to be offered at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, February 4, 2015, at the Cleveland County Genealogical Society's Genealogy Library, 1119 East Main Street, in Norman.

The application process and the documentation required to prove the facts in the *Pioneer* application will be explained in detail.

This workshop is free to all participants. Please preregister by phoning 701-2100, providing your name and phone number, to insure that we prepare sufficient materials.

The Norman Milling and Grain Company has a force of men at work tearing down the old Wingate elevator, just south of the city waterworks, and soon a vacant spot, made into a park, will mark its site. It will sure be a big improvement.

Friday evening some rascal stole a bundle of dry goods from in front of J.B. McKinney's. It contained several pairs of overalls and other goods purchased at Whitwell's.
