President's Message

In 1976 our nation's bicentennial celebration and the publication of Alex Haley's novel *Roots*, along with the 1977 TV miniseries, greatly increased public interest in genealogy and discovering one's family history.

Our Cleveland County Genealogical Society was organized in 1980. Soon members began indexing county records and finding materials pertaining to the history of Cleveland County and its people.

In 1989, officers of the Society approached the Norman Public Library administration, asking that the library provide space for a genealogy section. The library pleaded that no space was available. So we approached the county. Commissioners were also unable to provide space in a county building.

So our group determined to establish and maintain a genealogy research library on our own until such time as a new city library might be built. Our members donated materials, furnishings and labor before the Cleveland County Genealogical Society Library opened its doors in 1990 on North Flood Avenue.

As the collection grew, we rented additional rooms on Flood, moved in 1999 to store-front space on West Main Street, and in 2004 moved to the present site in the Community Services Building.

At the Society's monthly meeting in October 2015, we celebrated the 25th anniversary of the establishment of our Cleveland County Genealogical Society Library and Archives.

With the success of the October 13th vote in favor of the Norman Forward initiative, we can see that our dream of having space for a genealogy department in the public library will soon become a reality.

Our Board of Directors is working with the Pioneer Library System administration and the Norman Central Library staff on the details involved in preparing to move our genealogy collection to a new library, which is projected to be ready in the spring of 2019.

We'll keep you informed.

Lincoln's Tomb

In April of this year, historians marked the 150th anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's death with a reenactment of the funeral train which carried Lincoln's body and coffin from Washington, DC. to Springfield, Illinois. This ongoing account reminded me of my own visit to the monument in Oak Ridge cemetery in Springfield a number of years ago.

As with many fond memories of my travels across country, this one included my friend Grace. The two of us had been traveling and ancestor hunting with a friend of hers called Scotty. Grace and I had dropped Scotty off at home north of Detroit and were taking our time meandering our way back to Oklahoma.

On the road through Illinois, we wondered what we'd like to see and concluded shortly that we could spend some time observing all things Lincoln in Springfield. We thought of touring Lincoln's home and learned about the wait for tickets—not our favorite thing—and changed our minds. This matter of redirection is a rather common element when the two of us travel together, almost always leading to another grand adventure. On this occasion, we simply turned north in Springfield to Oak Ridge Cemetery to see the Lincoln monument for ourselves.

We shouldn't have been surprised to find a wooden roadside stand beside the cemetery entrance selling cheap touristy stuff. It didn't seem right. The monument itself suggested more respect. It is actually quite tall because of a column in the center, but the building is only three stories high. One walks through by way of a wide hall counterclockwise. The walls are carved with quotations along the way, and the imposing sarcophagus is deep in the center of the building. I remember being surrounded with marble and polished granite in shades of gray.

I had moved ahead of Grace, who was busy chatting with a new friend. At the sarcophagus was some red velvet rope, an American flag to one side and a guard on the other. And at the base of the marble was a small, but elegant arrangement of deep red silk roses. When I asked about them, the guard was willing to share the story.

About three weeks before, they had a visitor, a shy but charming young lady of four who had come ahead of her parents to lay her gift of roses in tribute. Her parents had prepared her well, telling her about President Lincoln, his contributions to history, and his tragic death. She was greatly moved by the stories, and it was her idea to bring flowers to the monument.

"And," the guard reported, "I just haven't had the heart to move those flowers, and the other guards haven't either."

When Grace came along, the story was repeated. Eventually, we moved along, but with a little more respect for the man, the monument, and the sincerity of a small child.

CCGS Library Report

We are nearing the end of the process of upgrading the CCGS Library catalog. Marilyn Henry and Mary Lewis worked many hours making the needed corrections to the catalog database.

We will soon begin our final task, taking inventory of the CCGS library collection for the first time ever. Once this is completed, we think our library catalog will be ready to go online.

With passage of the *Norman Forward* package last November, plans for the new Norman Central Library are moving forward.

The architect and Pioneer Library System staff have visited the CCGS Library a couple of times to estimate the space our materials will require in the new structure.

CCGS leaders are working with Pioneer officials to write a memorandum of understanding regarding the future integration of the CCGS genealogy collection into the genealogy collection in the Norman Central Library.

It is anticipated that the opening date for the new Norman Central Library might be as early as 2019.

CCGS now has a new, updated web site. Vicki Thompson, a recent graduate of the University's School of Library and Information Science, volunteered to build the new site and teach our volunteers how to manage it.

Pioneers of Cleveland County, Oklahoma Territory

Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T. provides a way for individuals to register their ancestors as pioneers who lived in Cleveland County prior to Oklahoma's statehood, by providing facts about the Pioneers' lives, families and residence. This *Pioneer* information will be placed in a permanent *Pioneers* file in the Cleveland County Genealogical Society Library.

These files will be available to researchers in perpetuity. A dozen couples have been nominated in the first two years of this initiative.

You can nominate your pioneer Cleveland County ancestor this year. Come by the CCGS Library, call (405-701-2100) or e-mail (ccgs@csbi.org) to secure an application and instructions.

Applications for this year's class of Pioneers. must be received by CCGS no later than August 1, 2016. Certificates will be awarded to those who successfully document their ancestor's eligibility to *Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.* status, at a fall meeting of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society.

Begin your application by creating a Family Group Sheet for your Pioneer ancestor, providing as much information as you now have available. Then create a pedigree chart, beginning with yourself and finishing with the Pioneer ancestor's generation.

The application will require proofs, which may include birth, marriage, or death certificates and other documentation. Our library volunteers can offer suggestions for alternate proofs when these official certificates are not available.

Pioneers Workshop Is Planned

A FREE workshop for those who wish to nominate their ancestor to the Registry of *Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.* will be held in the CCGS Library at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 6, 2016.

Meetings

January

There was considerable interest in the topic of our January meeting, when Freddie Baker shared information about the history of Germans from Russia. The audience was evenly divided between CCGS members and guests.

German immigration to Russia was encouraged by Russian rulers, beginning about 1762. They settled mainly in areas near the Volga River and the Caspian and Black Seas. They emigrated with neighbors and settled in Russian villages near people they knew, based mostly on religion, and retaining their German language.

Beginning in the 1870s, these Germanspeaking people began leaving Russia. Again, they traveled with people they knew, and settled together in the new country.

Those who settled in Oklahoma first came to Nebraska and Kansas, and were lured to Oklahoma by the land runs in the late 1800s. Just as before, they settled in rural communities, near a river, and their lives revolved around their church. Germans from Russia communities in Oklahoma are found in Washita county, and near Okeene and Shattuck.

February

Greg Boyd's topic this month was *HistoryGeo.com: Unlocking the Past with Original and Early Landowner Maps.*

Boyd demonstrated how to use the tools offered by HistoryGeo, then related examples from his own family research where the mapping technology he has developed helped to answer tough historical questions.

Oklahoma History Elementary School Textbook

When I took the state-required elementary-school course in Oklahoma history, I did not realize that my state was less than thirty-five years old.

That fact was recently reinforced when our library volunteers discovered a book donated a year or so ago by CCGS friend Rex Craig, who thinks of us when he finds historically significant items at garage sales and estate sales.

The title was *Elementary History of Oklahoma*, written in 1924 by J.F. Hatcher and T.T. Montgomery, administrators in the Chickasha schools. How much Oklahoma history, I wondered, could there have been to write about, as early as 1924?

The authors found plenty of history, beginning with the Spanish explorers in 1511, then the purchase and settlement of Louisiana Territory, the removal of the Indians and their subsequent settlement in Oklahoma. The Civil War and reconstruction, the Plains Indians, the cattle industry, and railroads each have a chapter. Next come the Boomers movement, the opening and settlement of Oklahoma, the territorial government and the struggle for statehood. A chapter is devoted to the administrations of each of the six governors who had held that office since statehood. Two final chapters discuss education and the state's agricultural and natural resources.

The Appendix contains two sections: *The Counties*, and *Biography*. The *Biography* section contains brief biographies of state leaders from both Oklahoma Territory and Indian Territory. I was most interested in *The Counties* section, which featured brief facts about each county in the state.

Below are the descriptions for Cleveland County and two neighboring counties.

CLEVELAND COUNTY.—Area, 525 square miles. Population 19,389. The county was named in honor of President Cleveland. It is known as one of the heavy cotton growing counties of the state. Norman is the home of the

Oklahoma University. This county has hard surfaced roads. Norman, population of 5,004, is the county seat.

MCCLAIN COUNTY.—Area, 562 square miles. Population 19,326. This county was named after Charles E. McClain, a delegate to the constitutional convention. It was formed from a part of the Chickasaw nation. The chief agricultural products are corn, millet, cotton, and potatoes. Purcell, population of 2,928, is the county seat.

POTTAWATOMIE COUNTY.—Area, 793 square miles. Population, 46,028. This county was named county B in the congressional act opening various reservations to settlement in 1891. Later it was named for the Pottawatomie tribe of Indians. Shawnee, the principal city, is the home of the Oklahoma Baptist University and the Oklahoma Catholic University. Tecumseh, population of 1,429, is the county seat.

This early Oklahoma History textbook makes it easy to realize the progress that has been made, in Cleveland County and in the state of Oklahoma, in the ensuing years.

Since You Asked ...

With the recent PBS showing of a documentary on the community of Langston, and the recent CCGS program on Black communities, I wonder what can be found in the CCGS library to research the history and people of these places in Oklahoma.

A So glad you asked. We were curious about this ourselves, and were pleased to find a few helpful volumes on our shelves, listed and discussed below.

Teall, Kaye M. *Black History in Oklahoma: a Resource Book.* Oklahoma City: Oklahoma City Public Schools, 1971.

Teall's *Black History in Oklahoma* is a resource book published for use by teachers in the Oklahoma Public Schools. In general sections, it covers African-Americans who traveled the Trail of Tears with Native American tribes, those involved in Oklahoma's military history including the Buffalo Soldiers, a listing and accounting of 26 black towns in Oklahoma with a helpful general map, and the cause and events of Civil rights (as it was seen at publication in 1971).

This book also includes a list of 24 black newspapers available on microfilm at the Oklahoma History Center. One might want to explore the *Boley News*, the *Langston City Herald*, the *Clearview Tribune*, or a number of Muskogee papers.

Long Road to Liberty: Oklahoma's African American History and Culture. Oklahoma City: Oklahoma Tourism & Recreation Department, 2015.

When Andre L. Head presented *Black Towns in Oklahoma* at the November CCGS meeting, he provided materials created by the Oklahoma Tourism & Recreation Department. This liberally illustrated volume covers early groups traveling to and settling in IT/OT, military history, and the culture and leaders of Black Communities, including the Greenwood area of Tulsa and Deep Deuce in Oklahoma City. Each section features places to visit, including contact information.

Cross, George L. *Blacks in White Colleges: Oklahoma's Landmark Cases*. Norman, Oklahoma: University of Oklahoma Press, 1975.

For Cleveland County in particular, we have the account of University of Oklahoma president Dr. George L. Cross regarding the case of Ada Lois Sipuel Fisher v. Board of Regents in the matter of her enrollment to the OU Law School.

A Word About the Privacy of Your Genealogy Information

A newsletter reader wrote today and asked a question that I think many people are asking. I replied to him in email but thought I would also share my answer here in the newsletter in case others have the same question.

My correspondent wrote:

I am relatively new to genealogy technology. Are there tips you can provide to ensure the security of personal information? Would building a family tree in software only [in] my computer be more secure than syncing it to a webpage (like MyHeritage)? Is it a good idea to not include details (name, date and place of birth) for all living relatives and maybe back a generation or two? Thanks.

My reply:

No. In fact, quite the opposite.

The various web sites have lots of controls to control privacy. Your computer on your desk and your laptop computer and tablet computer probably have no such controls. Hackers around the world are constantly trying to access your computer at home (and millions of other computers) through the Internet. In addition, there is even more danger when you take your laptop or tablet computer out of the home where it is exposed to loss, theft, and other risks.

Generally speaking, placing genealogy information or any other information in the cloud is more secure than keeping the same information in your own computer. I speak from experience; I had a laptop computer stolen a few years ago from the trunk of my automobile. The thief obtained everything: my bank account info, my credit card numbers, my Social Security number, the email addresses and phone numbers of most of my friends and business acquaintances, my family tree info, and more. Had I been smart enough to only keep that info in a secure area in the cloud, the thief would have obtained nothing.

I do that now. I still have my family tree info in my own laptop and desktop computers. After all, family tree information isn't secret anyway. Almost all genealogy information is publicly-available info available in various public government records and elsewhere. (Hey, that's

where I found it!) However, I now keep my bank account info, my credit card numbers, my Social Security number, the email addresses and phone numbers of most of my friends and business acquaintances, and more **ONLY** in the cloud and only by encrypting it first before sending it to a cloud web site. I never keep sensitive information in plain text on my own computers where it can be accessed by thieves and/or visitors to my home.

For the information I store on MyHeritage, I know the web site (and almost all other genealogy web sites) have excellent controls where names, dates, places of birth, and other personal information for all living people are never displayed to anyone else. When I log in with my user name and password, I can see that information. However, if you or anyone else looks at the information there that I made public, you do not see the personal information for living people.

By the way, I do keep a lot of non-sensitive information in my own computers where it is available to me and probably to thieves at all times, even without an Internet connection. Copies of most things are also kept online. My calendar, my shopping list, my favorite recipe for vegan chili, the jokes I collect, copies of my past newsletter articles, and hundreds of other items are not secret. I don't encrypt those and don't lock them up. Probably 98% of the things I save online and offline are not secret. Heck, if anyone wants a copy of those things, just drop me a note and I will send them to you!

In contrast, anything that I wish to keep secret is kept under lock and key (the key is called "encryption") only in secure web sites where I can access the information whether I am at home or traveling. Death of Mr. S.H. Peters

Mr. S.H. Peters, long an esteemed and respected citizen of Norman, died at his residence at 728 East Eufaula at 2;30 pm. yesterday, (Tuesday, Feby. 29, 1916), after an illness of several weeks with a complication of diseases. He was 69 years, 4 months and 14 days of age. The funeral will be conducted from the family residence at 10 o'clock p.m.

Thursday, March 2, 1916, conducted by Rev. R. L. Ownby. Interment will be in I.O.O.F. cemetery. Norman Lodge I.O.O.F., of which he was an honored member, will have charge of the funeral.

Mr. Peters was a devoted husband and father and good citizen, formerly connected with the Oklahoma State Hospital and held positions with firms in the city. Many warm friends regret his death. He leaves a wife and eight children to mourn his departure. They have the earnest sympathies of the community, in which the Transcript... joins.
