Where in the World is Alpha Hurst?

My maternal grandfather, Albert Byler Hurst, never said much about his side of the family. In fact, when my younger sister, Joan, asked him one time what nationality we were, he replied "We're part horse thief."

I knew that his parents had both died fairly young and that he and his brother, Ira, had moved to Bazine, Ness County, Kansas by 1910 and lived with the Nels Olsen family. Albert and Ira lost touch with another brother, Edgar "Ed" Hurst. Apparently, they did keep in touch with their sister, Alpha Hurst. Eventually, they found Ed Hurst in Colorado and were able to reconnect.

I asked two of my aunts about Alpha and neither one knew much about her except that she had married a man by the name of Smith. "Great!" I thought. "Finding her may be impossible."

I have a subscription to newspapers.com. Sometimes I will randomly put in family names to see what I can find about them.

I typed in *Alpha Hurst* and found an article in the *McPherson* (Kansas) *Weekly Republican* dated Friday, 6 Nov 1903 which stated "Miss Alpha Hurst of Lindsborg is staying with Mrs. Capt. Robinson." The name and place where she lived indicated to me that this could be my missing Alpha.

Continuing to search, I found an article dated 26 Feb 1904, also in the *McPherson Weekly Republican* that stated "Alpha Hurst received a telegram last Friday evening stating that her father had died at Ft. Scott. She left on the first train for that place to attend the funeral." I immediately checked the death date for her father, George Washington Hurst, which was Thursday, 18 Feb 1904. I had found my great aunt Alpha!

Additional searching produced an article in *The Salina Daily Union* (Salina, Kansas) dated Tuesday, 2 Nov 1909. "R. O. Smith, employed at the E. J. Kaffer grocery store, was married at McPherson Monday to Miss Alpha Hurst, a handsome girl of that city. They have returned to Salina and have already gone to housekeeping at No. 902 Gypsum avenue." Now I not only have proof that Alpha did indeed marry a Smith but I have her wedding date and her place of marriage.

Alpha O. Hurst Smith died in 1930 and is buried in Roselawn Memorial Park Cemetery, Salina, Saline County, Kansas.

There are times that I don't find anything when I search a name on newspapers.com. That doesn't discourage me; I keep on searching.

How else would I have found out that a great uncle discovered a rare yellow morning glory in Texas?

But that is another story!

Yellow Morning Glory

My cousin, Fran McPhail Ryan, texted me: *Name of uncle in Austin who was a florist?*

Another round of genealogical trivia was beginning. I immediately texted back: *Truman and Naomi McPhail, who owned Airport Florists in Austin, Texas.*

But Truman was our fathers' cousin, not his uncle. Then I remembered the story about McPhail Florists, and I had to dig deep in my memory for clues. One of our fathers' female cousins was a florist. I seemed to remember that her shop was further south in Texas, maybe around Beaumont.

My curiosity was piqued!

I searched newspapers.com for *McPhail Florist* and found the name *Virgil McPhail,* who was our grandfather's brother. Searching for Virgil yielded an ad in the *Austin American,* 9 Oct 1926, for the Hokey-Pokey, a grocery store that listed Virgil McPhail as the Proprietor.

"Babe Ruth knocked three home runs in one game but he hasn't anything on us. We knocked several at one hit when we located our store in the heart of the City Market in the seven hundred block on East Sixth Street. We have the cleanest, newest and one of the largest stocks of staple and fancy groceries in the city and our prices are right. Look these prices over and come see us. Sugar, 15 lbs., \$1.00. Crisco, 3 lb. can, 65 cents. *Head Lettuce, 9 cents. Why worry* about parking space and time limits. Come shop with us and take your time. Open evenings till nine o'clock. Checks accepted."

McPhail's Sunken Gardens appeared to be the place to have parties. A party was held in honor of a thirteen-year old girl. Virgil and another man were in charge of the program which, according to the *Austin American*, 3 July 1933, took the form of a radio broadcast.

Virgil's daughter, Ruth McPhail, was one of the attendees.

The Austin American, 15 Oct 1933, shows Virgil as the owner of McPhail's Wayside Gardens on Barton Springs Road, Austin, Texas. He speaks about sweet pea planting time in Texas and how the depth of planting is important. He is quoted as saying "soaking seeds in warm water for 2 or more hours will make them come up 2 or 3 days sooner than otherwise."

The San Saba News and Star, San Saba, Texas, 2 Mar 1939, contained an article featuring Virgil McPhail, florist inspector, U.S. Department of Agriculture, who "has received recognition and credit from a seed company of Philadelphia for his discovery of a yellow morning glory which is now in course of being developed in a seed laboratory". This plant was found by Mr. McPhail near Corpus Christi.

Other articles mentioned that Virgil was a flower show judge at the Weslaco Garden Club sponsored flower show, an event that, also, included "band concerts, hog calling, milk drinking, fat man's race, and horseshoe pitching contests." He spoke to Garden Clubs concerning rose diseases and their control. He was the chief floral inspector for azalea inspection on the Texas coast. I even learned that he bought a new Rambler in October 1965.

During my search, I kept in touch with Fran by text. I told her that I thought Virgil was the person she was seeking and that one of his daughters might have had the florist shop later on. "Yes, Virgil was the one," she said.

Fran also stated that Virgil "offered my Dad (Elbert Gates McPhail, Jr.) a job and a living space over the shop while he sent Dad to engineering school. But Dad chose love and marriage. It's all good and worked out as it was supposed to."

In the meantime, I contacted another cousin, Dolores McPhail Alter, in 2018. She knows more about Virgil's family than I do. She stated "Virgil and Rosa McPhail owned McPhail Florist located near Zucker Park on Barton Springs Road. When they divorced,

Rosa kept the shop. When she died, the shop went to their three daughters (Rosa Nell, Ruth Grace, and Laura Jeanette) who ultimately sold it to a close family friend who kept the McPhail name on the business."

Dolores's father, Billy Byron McPhail, wrote in an undated memoir, "Early in 1940, Miles (this author's own father, Arthur Miles McPhail) and I hitch-hiked to Austin, Texas to visit with relatives and to "scope out" the University of Texas for a possible enrollment there. ... With assurance of a place to stay and a job from Uncle Virgil, our Daddie's brother, who was a Florist in Austin," it seems that Virgil was interested in helping his extended family.

During my search, I realized that two of my grandfather's brothers had owned florist shops in Austin. Frances Marion "Frank" McPhail, Jr. opened the Barton Springs Floral company on Barton Springs Road 29 Dec 1933. He had five acres planted with spring flowers including one thousand Easter lilies, snap dragons, sweet peas, and roses. He recommended that Radiant Talisman and President Hoover roses be planted. (Frank McPhail is the father of Truman McPhail, who is mentioned at the beginning of this article.)

Virgil McPhail's World War I Draft Registration card (1917-1918) states that Virgil was a minister and was employed by the Stove Foundry Mission near Fort Worth, Texas. He was married with a wife and child. His World War II Draft Registration card (1942) stated that he is employed at the Scottish Rite Dormitory, Austin, Texas.

Virgil died in 1965. His obituary stated that "he had been a florist for over 40 years and at the time of his death owned the Avenue Florist at 19th and Interregional." Dolores drove past McPhail's Florist in Austin in March 2018 and was disappointed that the shop had closed and was sad looking.

And now the end of the story.

Who am I trying to kid? Is there ever a real *end of the story* in genealogy?

I sent a picture of the Yellow Morning Glory article to Fran, who replied, "Let's grow yellow morning glories."

"Oh, we should!" I agreed.

I repeat: I LOVE OLD NEWSPAPERS!

In the Library

We occasionally drive through the intersection of Acres Street and the railroad, just to observe progress of the new Norman Central Library building which is rising across Acres Street from Andrews Park.

Ten years after the Cleveland County
Genealogical Society was organized in 1980,
our members believed that Norman needed a
genealogy library collection featuring
primarily Cleveland County, its people and its
history. If the public sector could not provide
it, we would at least begin collecting
materials and offering them to all
researchers. The eventual goal was to
convince the people of Norman that our
genealogy and our history are cultural
treasures that require public support.

Every time we drive by the new Norman Central Library's construction site, we realize that we are one day closer to achieving the long-time CCGS goal of donating our now extensive genealogy book and archival collections to the local library.

Back at the CCGS Genealogy Library, just inside the south entrance of the Community Services Building on East Main Street, we observe progress of a different sort.

During the past two years, Kathryn Ramsay, genealogy librarian for the Pioneer Library System, has been working to prepare our genealogy materials for the move. When this part of her job is complete, all materials to be moved to Norman Central Library will have been cataloged and marked according to PLS standards.

Kathryn has worked our books through the Dewey Decimal numbering system, beginning with the 000 number items, and steadily moving through the collection. Now she is working in the 976.6 Dewey numbers, which include Oklahoma and Cleveland County items. These items may be temporarily unavailable to researchers, but will be returned to CCGS shelves and will remain until the moving date arrives.

That will be sometime in 2019.

I've seen reference to the Vertical
Files in the Cleveland County
Genealogical Society Library. Can
visitors browse these materials?
What kind of information can be found there?

Thanks for asking. Yes, you can browse in the Vertical Files. The contents represent much work by volunteers over many years.

Basically, the vertical files are divided into three categories: surname, locality, and subject, with each category limited to Cleveland County occurrences.

The surname files contain research on Cleveland County families. Since there is no point to researching a family when it has already been done, you are welcome to browse these files for your family names and to make copies if you wish.

The locality files are restricted to places in Cleveland County. These will include Cleveland County towns and places of interest in Cleveland County, such as the old rural schools. Most of these files include items of interest in Norman such as a list of postmasters, the Legacy Trail, the train depot, the 1893 tornado, and Sooner City on the O.U. campus after World War II. You also may find files related to the towns and even some of the rural communities in Cleveland County in the vertical files.

The remaining vertical files are the subject files. These include any materials related to genealogy that do not fit in the other categories. The subject files usually have some relationship to Cleveland County. You may find material on Lineage Societies, helpful tips on research problems such as finding female lines, and handout materials from past Summer Seminars.

We invite you to come by the CCGS Library and browse the Vertical Files. These days, our library is open two days a week, on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from l:00 to 5:00 p.m. And, of course, if you have a question, call 701-2100 during library hours.

These materials will be available in perpetuity to future researchers, held in the files of *Pioneers of Cleveland County, Oklahoma Territory*.

Materials and files in the CCGS Library & Archives will provide a major resource for documentation. Library volunteers can help you find relevant materials, suggest possible proofs, and answer questions about the application.

The CCGS Library is open from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday afternoons.

Will you volunteer to help in the library, just for the next twelve to eighteen months? Volunteer for two hours or four hours, once or twice a month, on a Tuesday or Thursday afternoon. Call the CCGS Library at 701-2100.

CCGS Meetings this Spring

At the March CCGS meeting, Brad Koplowitz, outlined preservation measures to insure long-term preservation of historical items. He also demonstrated several kinds of repairs for books and documents.

In April, CCGS hosted several lineage societies, who provided information about their organization and requirements for membership. Attendees had the opportunity to visit with representatives of the organizations in which they were interested.

The May CCGS meeting featured James E. Dupree, a doctoral candidate in O.U.'s history department, who spoke about the history of immigration. In the early years, there were no restrictions on immigration; everyone was welcomed. In the 1880s, exclusion laws targeted Chinese labor. The Customs Service was charged with enforcing immigration law prior to 1894. Dupree focused on the corruption in immigration enforcement during the Chinese exclusion era.

McLaughin as chief clerk of the selective draft board of Cleveland County, the board at its meeting on Friday night unanimously tendered the position to Mr. Ed. P. Ingle, and he has accepted, and is being instructed as to the duties of the office by Mr. McLaughlin, who will remain with the board for a month or so until the new man gets thoroughly posted. The board now consists of Messrs. H.O. Miller, T.E. Smith and Dr. C.S. Bobo as members and Mr. Ingles as clerk. ... It was, too, a clear case of the position seeking the man, for Mr. Ingle had no idea he was being considered for the position until it was tendered him. ...

The Transcript-Enterprise, for whom Mr. Ingle has been bookkeeper and collector, regrets to lose his services, but earnestly congratulates him. ...
