Things have really changed at the CCGS Library. We now have a new neighbor in the wing to the north of us, and their presence has presented some challenges to those of us who are involved in the management of the Library.

The new charter school, LeMonde International, is a language immersion school and will teach French and Spanish to start. They occupy the entire B wing, with the exception of the CCGS Archives. They also occupy space in G Wing, which is on the east side of the CSBI building, just north of the Alternative School. The B Wing is devoted to first through fourth grades, and G Wing has preschool and kindergarten. A playground will be provided for all grades on the east side. Drop-off and pick-up is taking place at the north end of the building. This means our south parking lot is not affected.

We have dealt with several problems during the six-week renovation of B Wing. It was considered a "hard hat" area, and therefore we did not have access to the restrooms, water fountain, or our archives. Several days we only had one row of overhead lights, and we felt like moles. The hardest adjustment we had to make was the lack of restroom facilities as the nearest restroom available to us during the destruction and construction involved a hike up the hallway to Work Force.

School started the last week of August. We are slowly being introduced to faculty and staff. We were totally taken by surprise the second Tuesday, when we heard a commotion in the lobby and realized that on bad weather days, recess would take place in the South Lobby. I do believe we volunteers will be able to take it in stride; however, we will need to close our door when we have patrons.

Open door or closed door, we will be here to welcome our library visitors during regular library hours, 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday afternoons.

Do consider attending these genealogy workshops presented by Pioneer Library System Genealogy Librarian Kathryn Ramsay. Each workshop will be held in Norman Central Library's Computer Center from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. on the date listed.

I Am the Third Generation

I read somewhere once that family stories are usually lost by the third generation.

I remember my grandmother, Bertha Frances Brewer McPhail, (13 Apr 1894-17 Nov 1979) telling me a story from her childhood. She was born in Lockport, New York while her father worked on the Erie Canal. There was a problem with the union there which caused some trouble. Bertha took her father his lunch one day and because she did, she saved him from serious injury during an incident by union supporters who attempted to kill or maim him.

My cousin, Frances Loretta McPhail Ryan's text read, "Did we have an ancient relative who worked on the Erie Canal?" I replied, "Yes, Grandmother's father, Adolph Frank Brewer." Fran replied "But it was built 1814-1825. How is that possible OR was it finished and he was maintenance guy?" Me: "Hmmm. I'm not sure of the answer. Sounds like a research project for me."

City directory records from Lockport show Adolph F. Brewer, toolmaker, living at 15 South, Lockport, New York, undated and Adolph F. Brewer, toolmaker, living at 172 Locust, Lockport, New York in 1899. The marriage license for Adolph F. Brewer, age 48, toolmaker of Lockport, New York and Barbara E. Fleischmann, age 30 of Chicago, Illinois states that they were married in Lockport, New York on 21 Jun 1893.

A search of newspapers.com led to my great-grandfather's place of employment. I first searched for Adolph Brewer. I found an article in The Buffalo Enquirer (Buffalo, New York) dated 17 Apr 1899 that mentioned a strike at the Holly pumping engine shops and that the company said that it would not weaken on the demand to discharge Adolph Brewer, foreman.

This article gave me the name of the employer of Adolph Brewer. It seems that on 20 Feb 1899, the molders at Holly Manufacturing Company went out on strike. The Buffalo Evening News, 20 Feb 1899 states "The trouble is said to have arisen because the company has installed a number of molding machines and employed non-union men to run them." The Democrat and Chronicle (Rochester, New York) article dated 21 Feb 1899 stated that "The union moulders of the shop complained because common laborers were employed on the molding machines, which can do the work of three to six men each, at wages below the minimum scale of \$2.50 per day for union labor." Later in the article it is

stated that "...a delegation of union men was sent to foreman of the department, asking him to lay off the men on the machine until Wednesday. The request was not granted and thirty-eight moulders quit work."

The Buffalo Commercial (Buffalo, New York) reported on 4 Apr 1899, Lockport, New York that "The Holly Shops in this city are still closed down and the company has not made any announcement yet regarding the discharge of Foreman Brewer and the reinstatement of Joseph Dussault who, it is alleged, refused some days ago to set a piece of machinery for an apprentice and was discharged by Mr. Brewer for so doing." Now I realized that I should search foreman Brewer.

The Buffalo Morning Express and Illustrated Buffalo Express (Buffalo, New York), 16 Apr 1899 stated that "The company yesterday offered to take the men back, but declined to discharge Brewer, the foreman of the tool room, who, the men allege is responsible for all the trouble." The company further "asserts that in the notice that Brewer has acted under orders from officers of the company, and under the circumstances, it will not discharge him."

On 8 May 1899, the Holly Manufacturing Company strike is over. A Buffalo Evening News (Buffalo, New York) article dated 9 May 1899 stated "The men went back to work yesterday morning. At noon a committee presented the charges of the men against Foreman Adolph Brewer to officers of the company. Brewer was asked to answer the charges, but he declined to do so, and tendered his resignation, to take immediate effect. It was at once accepted. That puts an end to a strike which has occasioned a net loss all around of probably no less than \$50,000."

The Holly Company was founded in 1859 by Birdsall Holly, a well-known inventor, for the purpose of manufacturing pumps and hydraulic machines, as well as other machinery. In 1861, the company built a 5-story building at Canal and the Hydraulic Race. They hired mechanics at that time. In

1862 and 1863, the Holly Company installed a fire protection system in Lockport, New York containing underground piping which used the Holly turbine pump to power the system. A triangle of land (Lock Street, Caledonia Street, & the Erie Canal) was purchased in 1864. Manufacturing facilities for pumps, boilers, and water wheel engines were built on this property. The Holly Company in Lockport burned in 1904. (An interesting side note to this information is that the author's husband, Richard Dean Harris and son, Luke MorningStar Harris are both involved in the fire protection industry.)

Sanborn Fire Insurance maps, which I found on the Library of Congress web page, showed me the approximate locations of my great-grandparents homes at 15 South and 172 Locust. A search for the Holly Manufacturing Company location in Lockport gave me its location on the Erie Canal. It seems reasonable for me to believe that the four or five blocks between home and business would be an easy walk for a five-year-old girl to make during that time.

While I found no mention of any incident involving violence against Adolph Brewer, I haven't given up on researching that part of the story. I did, however, find an article in The Buffalo Commercial (Buffalo, New York) dated 27 Jul 1897 that mentioned Adolph Brewer, as well as, my grandmother in the Lockport News section. "A German named Adolph Brewer, who resides on Locust street in this city, has taken up arms against the cyclists who use the side-paths, and the other evening he was discovered in the act of placing a long ladder across his front walk directly in front of an approaching cyclist. An officer from police headquarters soon stopped Mr. Brewer's little game and hereafter cyclists can ride along in front of his place without being troubled by him. The reason for his doing all this work against the wheelmen is that some time ago some careless wheelman ran his two-year-old daughter down and nearly killed the little child. Since then Mr. Brewer has been set against all bicycle riders and the many riders

of the silent steed have come to take another street than the one on which he resides.”

The 1900 census shows the family, including a son, Otto Brewer, living in Chicago, Illinois. My grandmother said that the family arrived in Indian Territory in 1901. A second son, Adolph Frank Brewer, was born in Comanche, I.T. in 1903. Adolph Brewer died at Comanche, I.T. in 1905 and his will was probated in 1905.

Adolph was granted several patents including one in 1887 for a supplemental bed-plate and a centering device and work-holder for drilling or slotting machine and another in 1889 for a gauge for grinding twist or flat drills. Fran has tools that were made by Adolph Brewer that were passed down to her by her father, Elbert Gates McPhail, Jr.

Because Fran asked me the question about an ancestor who worked on the Erie Canal, I remembered a snippet of a story that our grandmother had told me. Since I was able to research that story, I could fill in more information about our great-grandfather including information that wasn't told to me when I was younger.

Now this family story won't be lost to the fourth, fifth, and other future generations.

These Cleveland County Towns No Longer Exist

Case (12 mi. East of Moore). Post Office: 1 Dec 1890 to 31 Jul 1906. Named for Charles P. Case, first postmaster.

Linden (7 mi. South of Newalla) Post Office: 17 Oct 1893 to 14 Feb 1906. Named for basswood or lime tree.

Mardock (14 mi. East of Norman) Post Office: 31 Jan 1900 to 2 Jan 1907.

Pecan (9 mi. SE of Lexington) Post Office: 20 Jan 1896 to 31 May 1905. Took name from nearby grove of pecan trees.

Quincy (6 mi. West of Moore) Post Office: 21 Mar 1892 to 29 Feb 1904. Took name from Quincy IL, hometown of first Post Master.

Slusher (NE corner Cleveland Co.) Post Office: 13 Jan 1894 to 14 Aug 1905. Named for first Post Master, William P. Slusher.

President

In October of 2015 the citizens of Norman passed the Norman Forward bond issue. One project included in this bond issue was a new Norman central library. Plans for this library included space for a genealogy department. Our society's leaders were overjoyed that, after the failed votes of 2006 and 2008, the new central library was finally a reality. Placing our library holdings in the public library had been our goal since the beginning of our library in 1990.

The new library should be completed next summer. At completion, most of our collection will be moved into the local and family history space in the new facility. We understand that this move will be at the expense of the Pioneer Library System. There will be much work for willing hands at that time as we close our library space and seek a home for any records that the public library does not want, in addition to disposing of electronic equipment, shelving, furniture, etc.

In the president's report at the June 2016 annual meeting I announced the formation of a new committee to explore how CCGS would move forward after we no longer are responsible for our library. This four member committee chose Transition Committee for its name. At the time it was thought that merging with the Cleveland County Historical Society was a possibility. Our committee has met periodically for the past two years with a committee from CCHS exploring such a merger.

From the beginning we made it clear that our first priority was getting our holdings ready for a move to the public library. Recently we received word from the historical society board that they do not feel that a merger in the near future is a possibility. The Transition Committee will remain active and move on to other ideas.

Treasurer

The May 2018 Profit & Loss Budget by Month indicates there was a \$943.72 loss for the first eleven months of this fiscal year. It is anticipated there will be an additional loss this month. However, CCGS, overall, is managing its approved budget by having no difficulty meeting our annual expenses. This has been manageable by maintaining the Board's policy of having a year's expenses available in the Edward Jones cash account and the Republic Bank & Trust checking account.

Overall, income in the areas of donations, society income and dividends were less than

budgeted mainly due to fewer members, but proceeds from the Bakeless Bake Sale exceeded expectations and are an ongoing pleasurable source of income. Likewise, expenses have remained fairly stable with no unexpected expense like needing to replace any computers or printers.

With the anticipated move of the library to the new city library the cost will change considerably and we will all need to consider and participate in what will be the best way to maintain the Cleveland County Genealogical Society as a resource for the community.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee, comprised of Marilyn Henry, Mary Lewis and Chairman Mike McCurtain met on May 30, 2018 to discuss and prepare a budget proposal for FY 2018-2019. In anticipation of no significant increase in expenses, such as rent, insurance or electronic equipment and less donation and membership income, the proposed budget was scheduled to be \$480.00 less than the FY 2016-2017 budget. This budget was presented to the Board of Directors on June 19, 2018. It was discussed and approved to be presented to the general membership for their discussion and approval on June 19, 2018. A copy of the proposed budget for next fiscal year is available for members to review.

Bakeless Bake Sale Fund Drive

The Bakeless Bake Sale is the product of a brainstorming session in the spring of 2009 to improve the funding of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society Library.

An initiative to fund and build a new Norman Public Library had failed. We realized we needed help in funding the genealogical library that CCGS had founded in 1990. Membership dues could not rise sufficient to provide the funds we would need for the long haul.

We traditionally plan the details of this fundraiser in the spring months. This initiative is done entirely by mail.

Sometime in June, our member volunteers spend a couple of hours addressing envelopes by hand and then stuffing them with a card outlining the work of the Genealogical Society and asking for a donation. In addition to this card, we include a return card, on which donors will indicate the size of their donation and their contact information. A self-addressed envelope is included, and for non-members we include a CCGS brochure. This work is not mailed until after the July 4 holiday.

In last year's July 2017 fund drive, we received a total \$2,400 from 45 donors over the next five or six months.

The 2018 fund drive will be the tenth for CCGS. Over the first nine years of this initiative, 147 donors have contributed a total of \$21,675. This fund drive has provided just the financial boost we needed to support the CCGS Library until it would become possible to donate our genealogy and archival collections to a brand-new Norman Central Library.

That day is coming sometime in 2019.

Since You Asked ...

Q: I keep hearing about the Genealogical Society's Archives and how helpful this can be to researchers. I don't understand what you mean by "Archives." What kind of materials will I find there, and how can they help me?

A: Thanks for asking. Our Archives are a treasure trove of original Cleveland County records, going back to the very beginning in 1890. Original records—not copies, not microfilm. Most are courtroom records, including probate, divorce, and civil court. We also have a smattering of early citizenship records and a good representation of early rural school records.

What information might you find in your ancestor's probate file? The executor of the estate will provide proof that your ancestor had a will, and probate will proceed for a *Testate* Estate. If there was no will, the principal heir petitions the court for letters of administration for an *Intestate* Estate.

The court may appoint three to five disinterested people, usually neighbors or relatives of the deceased, to inventory and appraise all the property of the estate.

A guardian may be appointed by the court for children not of legal age.

A report of sales of estate property may list items sold and for how much. The purchaser may also be listed. Many of these may be family members,

Notices of publication will be issued at various times, especially before final settlement of the estate.

The names of legal heirs to the estate will be listed, especially when the balance is distributed to heirs in accordance with terms of the will or as determined by the administrator if the deceased died intestate.

A final settlement report was presented to the court, which ruled the estate as closed.

All of these may present new clues to the life of your deceased ancestor.
