Our volunteers will continue working regular hours in the Genealogy Library on various activities related to the move. We will plan occasional work days for certain projects.

Deaths

Long-time CCGS member Evelyn Parker died December 1, 2018 in Oklahoma City.

Long before the Internet made genealogical research easy, Evelyn researched over 400 queries received by CCGS. Her query research, with a surname index, is available to researchers in the CCGS Library.

When CCGS received the first group of original Cleveland County court house records in 1994, Evelyn and her husband, Charles, offered to house them in the barn at their country home near Lake Thunderbird. This large barn had been the family home while their house was being built.

With these materials nearby, Evelyn busied herself creating indexes to these records. Evelyn then single-handedly produced, stored, and sold our CCGS publications for years. She also was vendor for our publications at summer seminars and other events.

Evelyn continually looked for new projects. She periodically brought earlier Cleveland County cemetery indexes up to date, including Norman IOOF, Noble IOOF, and Lexington cemeteries. For many years she faithfully clipped obituaries, weddings and anniversaries from the Norman Transcript, organized them in scrapbooks, and indexed each volume.

Evelyn Parker was a treasured volunteer whose work with indexes and publications will continue to benefit every Cleveland County researcher—today, and long into the future.

My, How Telephones Have Changed!

Visiting the home of my grandparents as a child was like stepping into a different era. The furniture was much older and different from ours. The dining room was the largest room and served as the main room of the house, where we spent most of our time inside. There was a large dining room table, a buffet, a china cabinet and my grandpa's roll top desk. There may have been more, but I don't remember what, as there was little room left for anything else.

On the buffet was the telephone. I don't ever remember using the phone, but I do remember seeing my grandparents and parents use it. It had a dial that was used to call someone, and a separate part, a handset, that one picked up to listen and to talk into when they were on a call. The entire phone was quite heavy to pick up— a great paper weight!

Children didn't really have permission to use, nor did they need a phone in those days. This is why I only remember stories of how the phones worked.

There were private lines and party lines. The operator put through the calls. Some people were known to stay on the line and listen in to everyone's calls, even though they weren't supposed to! Private lines only rang once at your house and were meant for you to answer. Party lines had more than one person who shared the line. Then, you had to wait to see how many times the phone rang to see if it was your ring or someone else's.

At that time, phones were for adults more than for children. The only thing we used them for as we were growing up, was to see if someone could come over to play or go somewhere with us. You might have also asked questions about homework, if you needed to. I even remember being required to ask permission to use a phone!

There have been many different styles of phones in my life as I was growing up – Princess style (aka Trim Line), was one I always wanted in my bedroom, but we only had one for the

whole family. When I was in high school, it hung on a wall in our kitchen with an extra-long cord, so it could stretch into our living room, if necessary. A private conversation on a phone, in our family, was impossible.

When I had my own home, I think I still had my phone on the wall for a long time. We did also have one in the bedroom, though. One of the phones I loved was one that had its own box that hung on the wall with a bulletin board on the outside and the phone on one side with a place for your phone books on the other side of it.

For those of you who aren't old enough to remember, a phone book was a directory of names, phone numbers and addresses of people who had phones. The Yellow Pages provided the same information for businesses, as well as advertising for them. Nowadays, they only print the Yellow Pages and send them to each home with a telephone that is considered a land line. Since I did away with my land line this year, I will probably not get one the next time they deliver them. It is sad to think that the phone book would go away, too. We'll see.

I remember getting my first cordless phone as a gift from my brother, who worked in the phone industry in Texas for many years. You plugged in the base and left the phone on it to charge.

I remember one of the first times I used it outside. I was trimming the hedges at our house on Porter Ave. next to Wright's IGA. It wasn't a job Richard enjoyed doing, but I didn't mind, because I liked them to look neat. Richard brought the phone outside to me. As I was standing by the hedge and sometimes, in it, I received some stares from people coming from and going to the store.

Cordless phones were a rarely seen item at that time, in the 80s. I remember, this one was quite large and squared on the ends, with an antenna. I had to be careful not to walk too far away from the house, or I would lose the signal.

As cordless phones became more popular and less expensive to buy, the style changed to a more rounded look and smaller and, with time, there was no need for an antenna. We still had a corded phone, even when my girls were in high school. I love my photo of my youngest daughter, Erica, sitting in one of the chairs we inherited from her grandparents, talking on that

corded phone. She spent a lot of time on the phone when she was in high school. This was when we considered call waiting, although we limited the time she was allowed to spend on the phone. We did need to get our phone calls, too!

It was in the late 1990s to 2000s, I believe, that call waiting and call forwarding and even caller ID became available. Of course, there was an extra charge for these. We could now answer the phone, even though we were already talking to someone on the phone, in case there was an emergency. We could also forward our calls to another location, so we wouldn't miss any.

We could see at a glance who was calling us, so we could decide ahead of time, whether we wanted to talk to them! I remember, when I was in high school, we were getting 'heavy breathing' calls. My mom got a whistle, tied one end of a piece of string to it and the other to the phone. We were instructed to pick it up and blow it, if we got any more of 'those' calls. It seemed to work!

Nowadays, if you don't know who it is, you can choose to answer it or not! Nowadays, people don't hesitate to hang up on someone. I was taught that was rude. The world has changed and now, there are so many people out there calling you, trying to get your info or money, that we have to think of ourselves first and manners second!

Nowadays, even though the iPhone only debuted in 2007, everyone thinks they have to have their own cell phone, no matter what their age or situation! I remember, when my oldest grandchild was about 10. One day, he asked me how old he had to be before he got his own phone! I had to stall, to think of a good way to put it. I said, "Well, let me think. I believe I was about 50 when I got my first cell phone!" The look on his face was priceless. His jaw dropped and I believe a "What???" escaped from his mouth. Then, he shook his head in disbelief. At least, my daughter never bought him one. His dad and other grandmother got him one a few years later. It only caused problems.

I'm so glad I'm no longer teaching. They were starting to cause problems in school the last couple of years before I retired. I heard of kids totally distracted with them, cheating on tests with them and many other problems. I had to take many away from students. But, people

are so paranoid now, some with good reason, they think the only way to keep their children safe is to get them a phone. I wonder, do they think of the problems it can cause, too?

Since You Asked ...

Q One of my ancestors died in Cleveland County before statehood. Can I find a death record in the Cleveland County Genealogical Library?

A To secure an official Oklahoma death certificate, you must contact or visit the Oklahoma State Department of Health in Oklahoma City. These were generally not available until sometime after Statehood. We do have two collections that usually contain the death date and the place of burial.

Our Funeral Home records begin in 1918, with Meyer & Meyer Funeral Home records. They began as a furniture store that sold caskets to grieving families, later specializing in funerals. Meyer & Meyer was a sole source in Norman for several years, and closed in 1958.

Primrose Funeral Home has had the longest existence in Norman. Odies Primrose opened his business in 1933; he and his family operated it until the late 1990s. Primrose Funeral Home is still in business in Norman, operating under different ownership.

Mayes Funeral Home opened in 1956, serving the county under that name until 1992, when they reorganized as Guardian/Mayes Funeral Home. They closed permanently in 1999.

CCGS members, over the years, worked with the above-named local funeral home operators to copy and index their funeral records. Meyer & Meyer are available from 1918-1958. Primrose records include 1933-1999, Mayes records include 1956-1992, while Guardian/Mayes records cover the years 1993-2007.

What information will you find in a funeral home record? The most important is the intake record—information the staff secures from the family prior to the funeral. This includes all the basic genealogy facts, including birth, marriage, and death dates and places. Usually there will be information about the deceased person's family or a list of survivors.

Some funeral home records may include a copy of the state death certificate, which includes

information about the parents of the deceased, as well as identifying the person who provided the family information.

Another source for death information in the CCGS genealogy collection are the 32 indexes to county cemetery records, All Cleveland County cemeteries are indexed, with the exception of Resthaven Cemetery in Oklahoma City.

All Copyrighted Works First Published in the US in 1923 Will Enter Public Domain on January 1st 2019

Most U.S. genealogists have been told that all books and other documents published **PRIOR** to 1923 are in the public domain. In other words, those books are not under copyright. However, that rule is changing. Starting on New Year's Day 2019, [documents] published in 1923 are now in the public domain. The new rule will be: all books and other documents published **PRIOR to 1924** are in the public domain.

That rule will add another year again every January 1st thereafter.

Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.

Search the CCGS Archives for Proof NOW

Are you planning to nominate your ancestor to the *Pioneers of Cleveland County, Oklahoma Territory* registry this year?

We expect the CCGS library operation to be affected by the impending move to the new Norman Central Library, perhaps as early as June 1. Therefore, we suggest that you begin now to secure, in the CCGS Archives, the necessary proof documents to support your Pioneer application.

You are required to provide proof documents for birth, marriage, and death of your Pioneer and his spouse. You also prove date and place of residence in Cleveland County between April 22, 1889 and November 7, 1907. In addition we ask that you provide a link from each generation on your pedigree chart to the next generation. This requirement usually is satisfied with a birth certificate or a census record.

Proof documents can include any of the items listed below. Items preceded by an asterisk (*) are most likely to be housed in our Archives, and these records may be closed as early as June 1.

*Probate files, *Tax books, cemetery records, funeral home records, land records, newspaper files, obituaries, marriage records, *school records,* civil court records, *divorce records, census records, surname files.

In addition, you may use as proof: Bible records, newspaper clippings, photographs and other materials within your family.

Those who live nearby can visit the library in March or April, bringing the information you have about your Pioneer. We can find the documents in our collection and provide copies to you now. We can also advise you about alternate documents that can be used if you cannot find the best one.

If you live outside the Cleveland County area, you can send us a Family Group Sheet and Pedigree Chart. We will search for items in our collection that will provide the needed proofs.

Applications for *Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.* are due in the CCGS Library no later than Thursday, July 18, 2019.

Applications for the 2019 class of Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T. are due in the CCGS Library no later than Thursday, July 18, 2019.

Applicants will receive certificates honoring their Pioneer ancestors at the October meeting of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society.

Library Staff Prepares for Move

For a couple of years, Kathryn Ramsay, the Pioneer Library System's genealogy librarian, has been cataloging and preparing books in the CCGS genealogy collection to be moved to the new Norman Central Library upon its completion.

Our library volunteers have been busy compiling indexes to materials in our collection, as well as deciding what to do with shelved items that will not be moved to the new library. As moving time nears, we have begun looking at a backlog of donated books, which are mostly duplicates of current materials.

One group stands out. Several years ago, when Greg Boyd's Arphax Publishing Co. moved from Norman to Texas, they donated a sizeable number of their Family Maps series to CCGS. We cataloged 165 titles into the CCGS Library. Recently we sent the remainder (52 books, ranging from single titles to as many as nine of the same title) to the Oklahoma Genealogical Society.

OGS plans to add a single copy of each remaining title, a total of 39 books, to their organization's genealogy library, which is located at 1125 NW 50th Street in Oklahoma City. They will offer single copies of the remaining books to the Oklahoma History Center. Whatever is left over, they will offer for sale at their Spring Seminar on March 9, 2019, and they will send the proceeds to us.

We will be making similar decisions as the moving date approaches in summer or fall. After CCGS books and archival materials have been moved to the new library, we will have a big sale of what remains. This may include shelving, file cabinets, furniture, office supplies and books. We will need volunteers to help staff the sale.

Volunteer Typists Are Needed

We recently discovered typewriter-ready manuscripts of indexes to some of the **early tax books**. We need to produce printed indexes before the move. Please call to volunteer on a Tuesday or Thursday afternoon. If we don't hear from volunteers, we will be calling YOU!

Work with genealogy librarian to define our relationships and responsibilities in relation to how CCGS volunteers may be able to help in the transition to the new library and after the library is open to customers.

The pictures for the "Trail" have all been sent to the engravers and the staff is at work on the literary part of the year book. The past week the executive committee has done most of the work. Edith Conkling, Business Manager Miller, and Assistant Business Manager Morrison have put over the popularity contest.

School dismissed Friday at 2:20 so that all who wished could attend the funeral of the little child of Mr. and Mrs. Schannon. Mr. Shannon is a member of the Board of Education.

We wonder if all of the students of Norman High were as surprised as we were when we read in the Friday's Transcript that Miss Margaret Smith was the bride of Mr. R.L. Keller. At the Senior burlesque the gentleman has been seen and seems a very nice boy, but we never thought of the wedding. At any rate, Mr. Keller sure picked a dandy girl, but we don't suppose we need to tell him.

Correction: The Transcript is informed that there was no truth in the report published in yesterday's issue of the marriage

of Miss Margaret Smith and Mr. R.L. Keller, and regrets exceedingly that such publication was made. The item came through the mail on Friday morning, and the editor had no idea that it was not authentic, and therefore did not attempt to verify it before publication, as he probably should have done. Some "smart Alex" sent it as a joke, but it was certainly a poor way of joking. We ask the young couple's pardon for the embarrassment it has caused them, assuring them it was entirely unintentional on the part of the Transcript.

Counterfeit Molds Found by J.D. Pierson

While wrecking a house in the north part of town near the home of Mrs. Andy Berry, J.D. Pierson found a set of plaster paris moulds, behind one of the baseboards. The moulds had evidently been used to make counterfeit half-dollars and dimes, as impressions of those two coins were upon it—and very good impressions too. How long they had laid there is a question, but behind the same base board was found an envelope postmarked at Jonesboro, Ky., in 1895. The address on it was Mrs. A.S. Hardesty, Norman Oklahoma.

Jay's Acquittal Closes Famous Case

... On Thursday afternoon, March 6, 1919, the jury in the case of John Jay, charged with complicity in the murder of Deputy Sheriff Grover Fulkerson, brought in a verdict of acquittal, after being out seventeen hours, and coming into court twice during their deliberations to have certain testimony repeated to them. Jay was released from custody following the verdict, and returned Thursday night to his home in Oklahoma City.

This closes all proceedings in a murder that stirred Norman and Cleveland county to the very depths, on August 17, 1917, when the young deputy sheriff met his death at the hands of Chas. Holden and John Jay near the southwest corner of the D.R. Boyd section of land, west of Norman. The jury has said that Jay was not concerned in the actual murder, but he was in the Ford roadster with Holden when the murder occurred.

Holden and Jay were two notorious bootleggers, and when they were stopped by Mr. Fulkerson, who desired to search their automobile for liquor, they showed fight and in the scuffle that took place, Holden shot Fulkerson. Holden and Jay then piled the body of Fulkerson into their machine and brought him to Norman, where he died shortly after, but not before he made a dying statement, which later caused the conviction of Holden as the man who did the actual killing. Holden is now in the penitentiary serving a ninety-nine year term.
