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## President's Message

The 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society, and the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the existence of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society's Genealogy Library are coming soon. Our mission, for these past thirty years, has been to create and to maintain a collection of genealogical and local historical materials for Cleveland County residents, and to eventually see that collection of research materials housed in the local public library.

Our goal will be reached in the summer of 2019.

Pioneer Library System's Genealogy Librarian Kathryn Ramsay, has cataloged everything that will be moved to the new library when it opens later this summer. These materials now bear markings indicating that they belong to the Pioneer Library System. Soon Ramsay and her staff will begin packing these materials to be moved.

The CCGS focus at this time is getting ready for the move, as well as planning for the Society's future. Our library volunteers are organizing the materials that remain. We are fortunate that the Oklahoma Genealogical Society is willing to accept our excess materials and will place them in the genealogy library they are developing in Oklahoma City.

**Although the Cleveland County Genealogical Library is closing, the Cleveland County Genealogical Society will live on.** Our mission will change, moving toward service for family history researchers rather than sustaining a library collection. As our volunteers work toward the move, we continue finding future projects we can accomplish.

We will need help from many members to lead our projects into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century and the digital world. You have the skills we need. This is your invitation to help. Won't you call us today?

The CCGS Board will sign a lease in June on two rooms in the G Wing of the CSBI Building, to be used as an office and workroom. This is on the East side of the building. Parking will be available in Parking Lot #1

We will vacate the current Library & Archives space on or before July 31, 2019.

The CCGS Library will close to the public at 5 p.m. Thursday, May 30, although work will continue in the Library and Archives. Please E-mail or call/leave a message if you need to contact CCGS.

**James M. Bishop,  
Enumerator of the 1890 Census  
Township 8N 2W, County Three, Oklahoma Territory.**

That’s a big title to fill. Surely Mr. Bishop will be a diligent enumerator, with impeccable penmanship. And the microfilm image will be clear.

I should have known, from the very beginning, that this job would not be that easy.

I started my research on Ancestry.com, on their Family Trees page. Once I keyed in a few facts—James M. Bishop; born 1839 in Virginia; lived in Cleveland County, Oklahoma Territory—a wealth of family trees awaited me.

The only problem was that the trees did not agree. And the originators didn’t provide supporting documents.

I quickly decided this job must be done the old-fashioned way. Since James M. Bishop was not my family, I had to start with documents that place him in a particular place at a specific time, then follow these leads wherever they take me. This task filled my time for a week or more. My sources included the federal census, marriage records, pension records, city directories, Cleveland County Tax Books, early issues of the Norman Transcript, burial records, and Social Security claims.

Once I had collected some facts, I began producing a timeline for James M. Bishop on my computer. This required creating a time-based chart of my research, listing the support document, condensing the facts carried within the document, and noting the county and state where it occurred.

My timeline was finally complete, except for one item. I had created a space for 1890 census facts, but left it blank, because the microfilm image of the 1890 federal census of Oklahoma Territory was virtually unreadable. I knew that early CCGS volunteers, many of whom had personal knowledge of Cleveland County’s pioneers, had created an index of that census, which we are now publishing serially in the CCGS Newsletter. I actually have a computer version at my disposal.

I opened each of four files covering the 8 North townships we are publishing this year, searching for “Bishop.” I found only two

families, and the second family did not appear to have anything in common with James M. Bishop.

It was time to check the CCGS-generated version of the 1890 Census of Third County, Oklahoma Territory (currently known as Cleveland County.) Remember, James Bishop is the enumerator. What will we learn about him?

Often, the enumerator lists his own family at the very beginning of his work. Not James M. Bishop! He does not get to his family until line 9 of the first page of the document recording inhabitants of Section 8 North 2 West in County Three, O.T.

*Bishop, James M. age 57; born VA, lived in U.S. 57years; lived in O.T. 13 months (made the 1889 Run)*

*Bishop, Rosa A. daughter, age 4; born I.T.; lived in U.S. 4 years; lived in I.T. 8 months (since Oct 1889)*

W H A T ?

Even with all the research I had done, I did not see that one coming.

Perhaps we should just look at the *FACTS* I found relating to James M. Bishop.

James M. Bishop was born 7 November 1839 to Alexander Bishop and Lydia McElroy Bishop in Lee County, Virginia. Both Alexander and Lydia were born in 1815. Other family members in the 1850 census of Lee County included Alexander P. Bishop, age 14; our subject, James M. Bishop, age 11; William M. Bishop, 8; finally a sister, Elizabeth Bishop, age 4; and John, age 1. Last in the family listing was Elizabeth McElroy, age 75, whom I infer to be Lydia's mother.

By 1859 James Bishop had moved to Knox County, Tennessee, where he married Margaret E. Wood 8 August 1859. They were recorded on

the 1860 federal census of District 8 in Knox County.

Looking back to the 1850 federal census of Subdivision 15, Knox County, Tennessee. I found Margaret's parents. The family included Alfred Wood age 36, born in Tennessee; and his wife Sylvania, age 30, born in Alabama. Their children in 1850 included James Bishop's future bride, Margaret E. Wood, age 8; Thomas C. Wood, age 6; William A. Wood, age 5; and Mary J., age 3. Each of the children were born in Tennessee.

I did not find James M. Bishop in the 1860 census. I have tentatively identified an entry in the 1870 census of Yokum Station, Lee County Virginia to be the man who later made history in Cleveland County. James M. Bishop, age 39, and Elizabeth Bishop (perhaps this is the "E" in "Margaret E?") are listed with two children, Mary M.J., age 3; and Ewing A. 10 months old.

The 1880 census gets pretty interesting. James M. Bishop, his parents, siblings, and perhaps cousins have moved to Texas. The 1880 federal census lists the Bishops in Precinct 5, Collin County, Texas. This is about two counties south of Lake Texoma on the Texas/Oklahoma border. The 1880 census lists family members in this order: George C. Bishop, 28; James M. Bishop, 41; Squire Bishop, 21; Thomas C. Bishop, 17; Alexander Bishop, 66; Lydia Bishop, 59; and Mary L. Bishop, 24.

Connected to the above family, another group of Bishops appear. Beside the left-hand column marker, the enumerator (James Bishop) has noted: "*Should be Omitted*". The first names and ages of each individual are indicated in the list provided below. Otherwise, I have made no effort to identify the family connections in this group, which appears to be two family groups. All surnames are *Bishop*: William P. 41; Emma 25; William R. 6; Isaac T. 44; P.E. (name of wife illegible) 3; Flora A. 16; Choral L. 14; Nora L. 10;

William O. 8; Martha J. 6; Elijah A. 3; Roy I 3/12 (born February 1880).

We are not yet finished with the 1880 census. Margaret Bishop, James's wife, still lives in Knox County, Tennessee. She and the family members living with her are counted there. They include Margaret Bishop 38; Carson Bishop 18; Wesley Bishop 13; Eddie Bishop 9; Lillie Bishop 8; and Roy Bishop 6.

Of the thirteen families listed on the Knox County census page with Margaret Bishop, it appears she is surrounded by relatives, perhaps on both sides of the family. Four of Margaret's neighbors on that page bear the surname WOOD (John Wood, 88; Robert Wood, 28; Martha Wood, 37; Alfred Wood, 66.) One Bishop family appears on the preceding census page, and one Bishop family and two Wood families appear on the page following Margaret's census entry. Every one of these Wood and Bishop families share Margaret Wood Bishop's parentage patterns: the individual and both parents born in Tennessee.

The 1887 City Directory for Knoxville, Tennessee lists Margaret E. Bishop, living at 27 Chamberlain, Knoxville, as the widow of James M. Bishop. That's interesting. I know he lived to make the run into Oklahoma Territory in 1889. I know he served as enumerator for the 1890 federal census of Oklahoma Territory.

As my timeline for James M. Bishop approached the late 1880s, I began looking for local records. I learned that a James M. Bishop served as Captain in the 4<sup>th</sup> Tennessee Cavalry; he applied for an invalid pension 7 June 1886. James had a long wait, until 13 December 1890, when the *Norman Transcript* reported his pension had been approved.

A cursory view of the local newspapers in territorial times reveals that James M. Bishop was an active participant in the life of the community. A meeting notice for the Albert Carter Post G.A.R. No. 486 identifies James

Bishop as Adjutant for the organization. (And I thought that he fought for the Confederacy? Another surprise!)

The local newspaper informs me that James Bishop served as witness for his neighbor, Cornelius L. Moss, testifying that Moss has continually lived on, and cultivated, the land he claims.

James Bishop announces his candidacy for county commissioner for Cleveland County, subject to the choice of the people, on 10 January, 1891. Subsequent news stories indicate he won the election.

James M. Bishop, age 52, married Mamie Buck in Cleveland County, O.T. on 1 May 1892.

The 1900 federal census of Cleveland County records James M. Bishop, 60; Mamie Bishop, 18; and Hazel Bishop, age 6. All are listed as boarders at 209 North Main Street in Norman.

In 1910, James, age 70; and Mamie, 28; are listed in the federal census of Norman with two children, Hazel Bishop, 16; and James M. Bishop, age 2.

Three years earlier, James Bishop's first wife, Margaret E. Wood, died on 8 April, 1907. She was buried at Glenwood Cemetery at Powell, Knox County Tennessee.

Captain James Madison Bishop, Sr. died 19 November 1913. He is buried at Chandler, Lincoln County, Oklahoma.

These are the facts I have learned about James M. Bishop, the man who enumerated residents of Township 8 North 1 West in County Three of Oklahoma Territory, and later enumerated 8N 2W and 8N 3W.

Just the facts.

But I have many more questions. I cannot get all the answers in a single research marathon.

Sometimes family history is not handed to us on a silver platter.

# CCGS News

## The Big Day is Coming!

In 1980 a small group met in Moore to organize what became, within a year, the Cleveland County Genealogical Society.

This group immediately began projects recording the lives and times of those who settled Cleveland County in the early years, beginning in 1889 and 1890.

In their 40-year history, the Society has created at least 67 indexes to materials stored in the Cleveland County courthouse—and now in our Archives—including probates, marriages, divorces, and early civil court cases. This led members to begin dreaming of a library to support community members who were exploring their family history.

The local library did not have space in 1990. So members decided to take action. They donated their own genealogy and history books to the cause, rented space on Flood Street, and opened the Cleveland County Genealogical Society Library to the public. It was open limited hours, but the people had a genealogy library.

Member volunteers continued creating indexes to a variety of local records, including census, tax, and funeral home records. Additional rooms were added from time to time at the Flood Avenue location. And the genealogy library grew.

Society leaders sought help in the community in 1999. The Society rented a main street storefront. The City of Norman awarded CCGS a grant to purchase library shelving, as well as computers to create and support a catalog of their holdings.

Those were good years. Visitors increased, with the good visibility downtown. Donations from individuals increased also, and the library continued to grow. Over the years, members dreamed of the Genealogy Library someday becoming a part of the Norman Public Library. But that was not yet to be.

The CCGS Library needed more space, but could not afford the downtown rent scale. In August 2004 they acquired space in the Community Services Building, which has served them well.

We have been able to bring all our holdings under the same roof for the first time—tax books, and a variety of court files, including probate, divorce, and early civil court records.

And we still had a dream—a dream that one day, Norman would build a big new library, and that space would be provided in that library for the best of our collection.

That day is now coming.

Our volunteers are already engrossed in move-related activities.

The CCGS library will close to most research activities on June 1, 2019, as our volunteers concern themselves with getting ready for the move.

Our lease expires July 31, 2019. We will be moving our office activities to a new location within the Community Services Building sometime in June or July. We will rent an office space there for at least a year.

## **Preparation for CCGS Library Move**

Activity has ramped up as we actively prepare for the move of the CCGS genealogy collection to the new Norman Central Library. Our current focus is on books that will not be moved to the new library. Some of these books are currently included in the Norman Central collection.

Also included are donated books which were either already in our collection or were not accepted for one reason or another.

Library volunteer Jane Harris contacted LaNell Shores, a Board member of the Oklahoma Genealogical Society, which is currently acquiring and improving their genealogy collection in Oklahoma City.

OGS has accepted several items that Norman Central will not use, including National Society Daughters of the American Revolution materials, duplicate indexed Cleveland County Funeral Home records, and

an assortment of genealogical society newsletters from around the United States.

Mrs. Shores is checking with other local genealogical libraries to see if they are interested in the duplicate Boyd Family Maps books, which remain after single copies of every title from that donation were cataloged for the CCGS Library. OGS sold some of these surplus books at their last seminar and will attempt to sell more at their fall seminar. OGS returned to CCGS the money received from sales of these items.

OGS will purchase the steel library book shelves from CCGS when the shelving is no longer needed.

We appreciate the friendly help from the Oklahoma Genealogical Society as we work to prepare for the move and at the same time reduce surplus materials.

## **CCGS Will Move to New Location**

I'm sure you've all heard about the big changes going on at The Cleveland County Genealogical Society Library. This will bring changes to the Society, as well.

In addition to moving the CCGS book and archives collections to the new Norman Central Library, we also will be relocating the CCGS office to a new location.

Sometime this summer, CCGS will move to the "G" wing of the building. We have rented rooms N14 and N16 in the northeast corner of "G" wing. ## CCGS Meetings

**April 16, 2016**

Mason Cole shared the story of Mary Frances Thompson Fisher, who is better known as Te Ata, the Indian story-teller. She is part of Cole's ancestry.

Te Ata was born in the Chickasaw Nation to Indian share-cropper parents in 1895. She began school in a local tribal school. Later she attended Bloomfield Academy, a Chickasaw boarding school for girls, where Indians at that time were required to adapt to western ways. Te Ata never learned to speak the Chickasaw language, but her father told her many stories and legends from their Native American past.

Te Ata was the first Indian student to enroll in the Oklahoma College for Women in 1915. She became interested in drama, and was encouraged by her teachers to tell the stories of her culture. She also reached out to other tribes to hear and tell their stories.

Te Ata spent five summers telling the stories of many Indian tribes, as she toured with the Chautauqua. She once performed for Eleanor Roosevelt. Te Ata performed through the 1970s, and died just 38 days short of her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday.

**May 21, 2019**

Long-time members of the CCGS Family History Writers Group introduced attendees to the group's mission: to encourage everyone to write and to share their own family stories.

Group members explained techniques they use to get ideas for stories, including making lists, drawing pictures, maps, or diagrams, or getting ideas from the stories told by others.

Getting words on paper is the hardest part of the writing process, but every writer has the opportunity to make the first draft better. Of most importance is the idea that your own voice shows through the writing. You are the best judge of your own writing.

### Forgotten Projects Revived

As library volunteers begin preparations for moving, we have discovered some long-ago indexing projects that were possibly set aside during a previous move.

The first project we discovered was indexes of some of the earliest tax books. Pencil copies of 1892, 1894, 1896, and 1897 were found. We have published indexes of the intervening years: 1891, 1893, and 1895.

We recruited three volunteers to transfer these pencil copies to searchable digital files, which will soon be made available to researchers.

After the move, additional volunteers will be recruited to create searchable PDF copies of additional indexes produced by Society volunteers.

The Transcript learns he will soon return to New York city and marry a New York girl, and will be stationed there for some time in the Quartermasters' department.

Mrs. W.T. Mayfield received news today of the death of Mr. Mayfield's mother, Mrs. J.T. Mayfield ... She will be laid to rest in I.O.O.F. cemetery by the side of her husband, who died some years ago.

Elisha Gandy, a fine young soldier from overseas, returned on Saturday and is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Gandy, of this city.

Miss Viola Stoner returned home Saturday from Drumright, where she spent a very pleasant two weeks with relatives. She was accompanied home by her aunt, Mrs. J.S. Rush and little son, Rupert, who will visit here a few days.

The Bide-a-Wee club met Thursday afternoon with Mrs. Henry Meyer. The afternoon was spent in needle and conversation, after which a delicious lunch was served. Additional guests were Mrs. Lynn Caton, Mrs. A.N. Kenney of Guthrie, Mrs. T.T. Webster, Mrs. Milton Meyer and Miss Foy Runyan.

## Do You Want a Ride In An Airoplane

Billy Parker, the Dewey flyer, will be in Norman on Monday, June 23rd, at 7:30 a.m., for one day only, and will take passengers up in his Curtiss airoplane for \$10 each. He was in the service twenty-two months, thirteen months of which were spent overseas. He served with the Army of Occupation in Germany until May 19<sup>th</sup>. He had many exciting experiences, and is glad to get back to the good old U.S.A.
