## One Visitor's Search for Heritage

Visiting the new offices of The Cleveland County Genealogical Society, Inc. is an adventure! In more ways than one. Since our Society's new sign isn't up yet, we are going out to the parking lots and searching for the lost callers who aren't sure where to find our new office. First, we find them, then we try to find their lost relatives. As any genealogist can tell you, sometimes it's easy and other times it is not.

A former patron, whom we had helped work on her family tree several years ago, brought in a friend who was looking for documentation on his Choctaw family. We were able to find this man's great-grandmother, Elizabeth M. Loring, on the U.S. Indian Census Rolls in 1885. She was on the roll with her mother, Sarah, and sister, Clarry. We found Elizabeth had married Charlie W. Woods.

After mentioning this to our visitor, he remembered a story about an uncle who had gone to court and had Indian land taken away from Elizabeth's daughter, Sadie Woods. Ancestry.com had an Oklahoma, Wills and Probate record, 1801-2008, listing for Sadie Woods, minor daughter of Elizabeth Woods dated 17 Sep 1906. At the time of the filing, Sadie was eight years old and lived in Wade, Indian Territory. C. W. Woods filed a guardian's bond. Court documents state that the land in question was left to Sadie by her grandmother, Mrs. R. M. Gentry. R. M. Gentry, the husband of her grandmother, held nearly one-half portion of the land in question and stated that he had the right to remain on the land and cultivate forty acres during the year 1908, and that he should give possession at the end of that time.

Another page in the record stated that C. W. Woods was the guardian of the person and estate of his minor daughter, Sadie Woods. He asked that he be allowed to sell the land belonging to Sadie Woods by inheritance, in public auction.

Aha! It wasn't an uncle of Sadie's but her own father who had taken Sadie's land.

Said order was duly published in the Bryan County Democrat, a newspaper published in Durant, Oklahoma for three successive weeks. The land, Lots No. 1, No. 2 and the W/2 of the NE/4 of the NW/4 of Section 6, Township 8 South, Range 12 East of the Indian Base and Meridian was sold to the highest bidder, C. C. McCarty for \$1,750.00 on Tuesday, September 1, 1908.

By 5 Feb 1913, Sadie had married E. M. Adams. A document filed then stated that L. T. Martin was purchasing

The petition to sell real estate states "That the said Sadie Adams, nee Woods, is a married woman in the 16<sup>th</sup> year of her age; that she is a member of the Choctaw Tribe of Indians and is enrolled as a one-quarter (1/4) Choctaw Indian, under Roll No. 9628 of said tribe; that the said Sadie Adams, nee Woods, is a minor and the daughter of the petitioner and that both are residents of the County of Bryan, State of Oklahoma, and have been for more than one year next preceding the filing of this petition." It also states that the above-mentioned land had been selected as her Indian allotment. The Bennington Tribune, a weekly newspaper, published the sale information. Later paperwork states that L.T. Martin paid \$1,500 for the land.

A search on newspapers.com found a news article from The Durant Daily Democrat dated 26 Nov 1961, which celebrated the 50<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary of the Bryan County farm couple, Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Adams. The article stated that E. M. Adams and Sadie Woods were married November 22, 1911 at Wade, Oklahoma and mentioned that they had been involved in farming all of their married life. When asked about their life together, Mr. Adams said their life was happy but particularly difficult during the Depression. They raise small grain and hay for their cattle on the 140-acre farm. Mr. E. M. Adams' grandfather had the herd of cattle when he died in 1901. This article was

printed to give to our visitor, who commented that he remembered the dress that his grandmother, Sadie, wore in the photograph.

The Irish side of our visitor's family had more information available. His parents were Ithel Morgan "Dick" Adams and Etholine Gertrude "Trudy" Cude who married 17 Apr 1938 in Arizona. Trudy's father, Asa Woodrow "Woody" Cude was a private in Co. E, 3<sup>rd</sup> Regiment Texas Infantry in the Spanish-American War.

Woody's father, Timothy Jackson Cude, enlisted in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Texas Mounted Rifles between 1862 and 1864. The newspaper headline of the Dallas Morning News dated 25 September, 1929, states "Survivor of Last Conflict with Southwestern Indians Buried in Live Oak Cemetery." To quote this article, "A saga of United States history is written in the lives of Mr. Cude's family, since some member of it has served in every war the Stars and Stripes have entered, beginning with the War of the Revolution.

His mother's great-grandfather, Billington Taylor, was a famous scout and soldier in the Revolutionary War; his great-grandfather Winters, took up arms in the War of 1812. Mr. Cude and three brothers, Jack, Dick, and Will Cude, served in the Civil War. A son, W. A. Cude, saw service in the Spanish-American War, and many descendants were in the last great war." Our visitor is himself a Vietnam Veteran where he served in the Navy.

My first thought on reading this obituary was "Wow, just think of how many lineage societies this man could join!" including the First Families of the Twin Territories sponsored by the Oklahoma Genealogical Society. Timothy Jackson Cude was a Texas Ranger. He is buried at Oakville Cemetery, Live Oak County, Texas.

Timothy Cude's mother, Lillie Ellen Winters is listed on an historical marker at Winters Memorial Park. The marker states "Lillie Ellen Winters Adams-Cude-Edwards mothered twenty-one children. She first married Thomas Adams. They had one child before his death. She married William A. Cude, Jr. whose wife, Elenor Long, died before the Battle of San Jacinto, leaving 7 children. Four sons were born to Lillie and Mr. Cude. Cude died in 1847 on his place, formerly the head right league of Wm. Ware. Lillie's third husband, C. O. Edwards, a soldier in the 1836 conflict, had 2 children. Lillie and Mr. Edwards had seven. Lillie lived 89 yrs. (1969)"

According to Find-a-Grave, "Winters Memorial Park was established in memory of James and Rhoda Beall Winters and their thirteen children. This cemetery is located 10 miles east of New Waverly, Texas. Follow Hwy 150 east to FM 2693, and then travel about five miles. Since the original grave sites were destroyed, the monuments were repaired or replaced in this park in 1968. J.J. Head and his wife Lola Winters Head, chaired this project for the family."

A marker placed by the Texas Historical Survey Committee states "James Winters, veteran of several American wars was 62 when he left his new home to fight for Texas in the 1835 conflict with Mexico. In the 1836 Texas War for Independence, he and a 15-year-old son, Benjamin, hauled supplies to the Texas army. In that war were three sons, Wm. C., J.F., and James W. Winters, and two sons-in-law, Jackson Crouch and Charles O. Edwards."

Isn't it the truth that the more you research your genealogy the more you find that you need to research? This is certainly the case with our visitor's genealogy. It has

been a joy to aid him in his search for family history.

The Cleveland County Genealogical Society Family History Writers Group encourages you to write your family stories. So much of our visitor's history would have been lost, or more difficult to find, if his family members had not been writing their family history. Our visitor, himself, is a fine story teller and remembers so much of his family history.

### **Directors and Officers Elected**

At the annual meeting of the Norman Library association, Jan. 23 [1903], the following seven directors and officers were elected: Mrs. D.B. Boyd, president; Mrs. J.M. Heddeas, vice president; Mrs. W.S. Hamilton, secretary; Mrs. H.P. Alden, treasurer; Mrs. L. J. Edwards, Mrs. L.W. Cole and Mrs. S. K. McCall. Miss May Heddens was elected librarian. During the past year there has been in the treasury \$317, and of this amount \$264 has been expended. Over one hundred books and twenty Wernicke cases have been purchased.

### **Family History Writers Group**

At the turn of the current century, CCGS was hosting a monthly Discussion Group. At their meeting on October 25, 2001, participants listened to an audiotape encouraging us to write about our own family history.

Interest was so great that the group spun off a new special-interest group, the Family History Writers Group, which met for the first time on November 7, 2001. Since that date, Writers Group has met monthly at 10:00 a.m. on the second Wednesday of every month.

Attendees are encouraged to write a story from their childhood, about individuals in their family, about incidents in their lives—about any aspect of their family history, going all the way back to the earliest ancestors—whatever appeals to the writer.

The CCGS Writers Group meets regularly at 10:00 a.m. on the second Wednesday of the month. Visitors may bring a piece of writing if they wish. Stories are read aloud and discussed. The group celebrates every writer's effort.

About noon, the group adjourns, and customarily goes for lunch and more conversation in a local restaurant. Visitors are welcome.

### **CCGS Annual Business Meeting**

The Annual Business Meeting of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society will occur at the Norman Public Library Central on Tuesday, June 16, 2020, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

This will be an important meeting for our Society, as we have completed our primary goal of the past thirty years: offering and supporting a local genealogy library for those who research their family history.

On July 31, 2019 the transition was completed. Pioneer Library System accepted responsibility for many books in the CCGS genealogy collection. Others were donated to state-wide genealogy groups, including Oklahoma Genealogical Society and the Oklahoma History Center.

Library furnishings were sold to Oklahoma Genealogical Society and to teachers at Le Monde charter school, bringing \$1,305 into our treasury. Some items were donated to non-profit organizations with headquarters in the Community Services Building. We can report that we got rid of *everything* that we could not sell, give away, or take to our new office in Wing G of the CSBI Building

Those who attend the Annual Business Meeting can contribute to the discussion of where our organization goes from here.

Members will vote on a revised Mission Statement that no longer assumes responsibility for a genealogy library. A revised update to our Bylaws will also be approved by members at the Annual Business Meeting.

Just request the required application form and instructions. You will be asked to provide a family group sheet and a pedigree form for your Pioneer ancestor, as well as minimal information about the generations between you (the applicant) and the Pioneer. We like to see stories and photographs (if available) related to the Pioneer generation.

Most of the source materials required for proofs in your application are now housed in the new Norman Public Library Central. Applications for the 2020 class of *Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.* are due in the CCGS Library no later than Thursday, July 16, 2020.

Applicants will receive certificates honoring their Pioneer ancestors at the October meeting of the Cleveland County Genealogical Society.

Your application will be added to the *Pioneers of Cleveland County, O.T.* files and will be available to future researchers in perpetuity—perhaps to your own future great-great grandchild!

## Moving Toward New Goals

Cleveland County Genealogical Society has successfully reached its long-time goal—donation of our thirty-year collection of genealogy books and Cleveland County archival records to the Norman Public Library Central, which opened in early November.

This year, in 2020, our Society is taking stock, looking at our role in the community, seeking a vision of the role we will play with the public library and with local genealogy buffs going forward.

Some projects reveal themselves. We must update the CCGS organization's Bylaws. The Mission Statement appears early in the Bylaws document, and by itself requires an omission.

It is clear that the first two and the last of the four bullet points continue to be important goals of CCGS. It is equally clear to CCGS that we no longer host a genealogy library; therefore, the third point must be eliminated.

Board discussion is ongoing, but your officers will be offering a new line on the Mission Statement. This line will propose that CCGS begin providing digital local historical records materials online.

The Board envisions that this project will appeal to retirees who seek a fulfilling role in our community. We will be actively seeking new members who have experience working with digital data.

## **Pay-Up Campaign Is Declared Successful**

The Pay-Up campaign in Norman, which opened March 1, was pronounced a decided success by Norman merchants Saturday afternoon. They were unanimous in favoring its establishment and a permanent institution for the University City.

Merchants reported ... that they were expecting large collections Saturday night, following the weekly pay day. ... Many people had come to the stores and promised to settle their accounts before the close of the campaign.

Some paid-up debts reported by local merchants had been carried on their books for two or three years, but most of the newly settled accounts are of only three or four months standing.

"The Pay-Up campaign is the biggest result getter we have had for collecting," S.K. McCall stated Saturday.

## **15 Gilts Given**

Arrangements have been made thru the Farmers State Guaranty bank of Lexington to furnish fifteen pure bred Poland China gilts to the boys in the vicinity of Corbett without cost to them.

The plan is that the boys shall return two gilts when they are eight months old in return for their sow and the rest of the litter.

The bank is also buying a purebred boar and giving it to the club for breeding purposes.

## **License Business Is Improving Here.**

This year, comprising two and one half months, fifty-two marriage licenses have been issued at the office of the county judge. ... The increase is about thirty percent.

So far there have been thirteen cases of divorce filed as against ten during the same period last year, making a thirty per cent increase.

Comparing the divorce cases filed with the license issued this Spring, the stand with a ration of thirteen to fifty-two. ...

## **Hospitals Adequate, Say Norman Doctors**

Sunnyside hospital has ten recently incorporated with Mrs. Belva Capshaw, Clyde Pickard, and William Synnott as stockholders.

Norman is not particularly supplied with hospitals for a town of its size according to physicians, but as it is so near Oklahoma City facilities are adequate.

The university infirmary is "good for the doctor and good for the student," Dr. J.L. Day says and the record given out by Miss Wilhelmina Osterhouse, who has charge of the infirmary, bears out the statement.

Since September there have been 157 patients in the infirmary, and several of these have been two or three times, and not a patient has died. The average length of time each one spends in the hospital is from three days to a week, Miss Osterhaus says.

Earl Deacon, suffering from an infected hand, and Omar Lyon, recovering from an operation, are the only ones in the infirmary at present.
