Especial thanks are extended to Hon. John E. Millar, Mayor of Norman, who has by his courteous dealings and many favors shown the publishers assisted very materially in making this work the success it is, and is duly appreciated by the undersigned. We also feel greatly obligated to Mr. R.D. Alexander, City Engineer, and his corps of able assistants, for their untiring work in furnishing the necessary data of alphabetical list of names.

Norman is one of the prettiest towns of its size in the big Southwest. It is the county seat of Cleveland County, and it is modern in all respects. Three banks do a good business, three newspapers flourish like green bay trees, and a large number of mercantile establishments have a thriving trade. Norman possesses one of the best opera houses in the state, a public library, and a number of good hotels. Its streets and sidewalks are wide, even, and well kept, and a fine system of water works furnish the best water in the State. The town is splendidly lighted with electricity, and it has a very effective fire department. Norman is well built, its business houses being almost entirely of brick. Its homes are comfortable and nicely kept, and have good gardens and lawns.

Morally, socially, and in a business way, Norman is a good place in which to live.

Recent Activity at CCGS

The Cleveland County Genealogical Society Office has been closed since early March, due to restrictions related to the Covid-19 Coronavirus shut-down.

The Board of Directors met in March, but not in April or May. Our officers, whose ages average near 81 years, are in the high-risk window of Covid-19, and they are unwilling to risk their health and their lives beyond the standard of "shelter in place."

Our president, Jean McCracken, continues to monitor the mailbox and presents current bills and income to Treasurer Mike McCurtain. Mike, in turn, keeps financial records updated, pays bills and deposits checks in our bank account. Our Newsletter editor, Mary Lewis has spent much time in recent weeks gathering scarce news for publication. Otherwise, our officers—and hopefully, our members, too—have spent much time sheltering in place at home.

Writers Group Zooms to Meet in May 2020

In October, 2001, an ongoing CCGS Discussion Group spun off the Family History Writers Group, which met for the first time on November 7, 2001.

This group has since met monthly, without fail, for the intervening seventeen years, until the Covid-19 Coronavirus left them without a meeting place in March 2020. Group members sought online alternatives to the monthly Writers Group meeting. One member, Tricia Carleton, offered to lead a trial meeting featuring the Zoom app. Attendance did not meet expectations in April. The group tried again in May, with three members and two guests in attendance.

After seventeen years of writing about our Family History, writing is in our blood. We will continue the Zoom experience June 10. You are invited to participate.

CCGS Strategic Plan II, Year 3 January 2020 to December 2020

With the completion of the CCGS thirtyyear goal to integrate the Society's library and archival holdings into the Norman Public Library Central's Genealogy collection, CCGS seeks new direction forward.

Year 2 of Strategic Plan II stretched out to eighteen months, as the move into the new library building took place. We now begin Plan II, Year 3, on a twelve-month calendar plan (January 2020 through December 2020), rather than the previous twelve-month Fiscal Year plan.

In recent months, the Board of Directors has set up goals to be accomplished in six designated areas during the current calendar year, as outlined below.

Policies and Procedures:

Set up a committee, or assign someone to go through and organize the policies and procedures files. Delete any that no longer apply. Suggest others that possibly should be added.

Finance:

Evaluate the Investment account and the Cash account. Husband the finances of the Society.

Membership

Contact every person who responds for volunteer projects, and find an appropriate job for each, if possible. Consider reducing membership fees. Offer membership forms at every official function of the Society.

Publicity

Reach out to organizations who might be interested in genealogy. Continue working with Kathryn Ramsay to share the Public Library's schedules through the Society's publicity efforts.

Preservation

Create searchable PDF files of our existing indexes and other materials, to be offered on the internet, either on the CCGS website or through Pioneer Library System. Seek volunteers who possess the requisite skills to create online files.

<u>Genealogy Collection,</u> <u>Norman Public Library Central</u>

Seek opportunities for Society members to assist the genealogy department in meaningful ways.

Issues Call to Organize Women of County Meeting Saturday in Courthouse

To the Democratic Women of Cleveland County:

Pursuant to the call of Mrs. R.L. Fite, state chairman of the Educational Bureau of the Democratic National Committee, I hereby call a mass meeting of the democratic women voters of Cleveland county to meet at the district courtroom in Norman Saturday, June 19, at 2 p.m., for the purpose of perfecting a county woman's organization.

Mrs. Fite and other prominent women workers will meet with us and I urgently request that all women who possibly can, attend this meeting.

We have now assumed the full right of citizenship and it is our duty to better prepare ourselves for this great responsibility.

Josh Lee Will Go to Rotary Convention

H.L. Muldrow and son, Alvin, and Josh Lee, member of the university faculty, left today to attend the international Rotary convention at Atlantic City.

Mr. Muldrow is president of the local club, and was recently elected as a delegate. Josh Lee is going along as official entertainer from the Norman club, and in that capacity will put Norman on the map. ... The Rotary club is indeed fortunate in having so able an entertainer make the trip, as the Transcript is sure he will make a big hit and is an appropriate representative.

Charles Gorton Is Back to Norman Home

Charles T. Gorton, old-timer, who homesteaded the farm on which the university now stands, returned from ranching in Roger Mills county near Inola to live at his home on the Boulevard this week.

Gorton was one of the earliest of cattlemen here in the "territory" and ran his herds around Purcell as early as '85. He says that the whites were just intruders and the Indians understood that fact very well, indeed. They would kill several beeves belonging to white drover, and the owners might kick and cuss but they could do nothing about it, for the land belonged to the Chickasaws.

Several cattle runners made complaint to the Indian agent at Darlington about these high-handed outrages. They received word that the only official recognition taken of such complaints was ordering out the troops and having the herds driven entirely out of the Indian country. Naturally the cattle men did not consider it policy to press their complaining for they were receiving pasture for their herd almost free. ...

Wild animals and Indians were all that could be found here when Gorton first hit this country. He tells of one night when the herd riders were out singing around the bunch and the cattle were browsing quietly and lying around, a piercing scream rent the air off in the distance. Next morning the cook found that the beef he had slaughtered and wrapped in its hide had been dragged and half covered with leaves by a panther during the night.

Gorton says that he has been on his 280 acre cattle ranch since he left here but thinks he might just as well come back where he feels at home and let someone else take care of his purebred Durhams in Roger Mills county.

Clark Reports on Schools of County

"If other school districts do not consolidate as Moore has done, it will cost them a total of \$6,000 to transfer their high school children to other schools," said W.R. Clark, county superintendent this morning.

There will be about eighty students that should be in the eighth grade next year in three groups of districts that might consolidate according to Clark's figures. If they were consolidated and had high schools those young folk, who must go away to other districts to school or forego any further schooling, could stay at home.

Boys and girls at home are assets, for they can do chores and work Saturdays while attending school. Those same youngsters away from home might fall under bad influences and form bad habits in the idle hours away from home ... Such ... arguments he suggested in favor of consolidation.

"Have Only Begun" to Fight

Star, Banner, Canada and Alamo should consolidate to their own great advantage, is the superintendent's opinion. They have held three elections on the proposition in the last two years and turned it down each time. ... The coming year they will have to send out about twenty-five who are ready for high school work or keep them out of school entirely, Clark says.

Corn, Pleasant Valley, New Hope, and Liberty are four more districts that might be consolidated. ...Thirty-five are ready for high school from these places this year. Clark states that they should save \$2,625 by consolidation, calculating \$75 per pupil transferred. An election for centralization was held a year ago last March ... The proposition lost.
